 - Complexity of issues
 - Proactively distribute the workload as seven bylaws and policies are due for review by 2022
 - Covid-19 time to pause and reassess the bylaw
- Propose timeline for review
- Input from elected members to set direction for the review.

- Seven documents coming up for review in 2022, and a further three due for review in 2023.


Constraints

- Freedom Camping Act 2011 cannot ban freedom camping
- Council can prohibit or restrict camping only for the following purposes (criteria) per s11(2)(a) of the FCA
 - to protect the area
 - to protect the health and safety of people who may visit the area
 - to protect access to the area.
- Current bylaw
 - Non-self contained camping is already allowed legal implications
 - Adding or removing prohibited and restricted areas triggers consultation



Perceived issues

- Social license for freedom camping
- Nuisance concerns outside the scope of bylaw
- Is the bylaw over prescriptive?




Demonstrated issues

- Increased pressure on our key destinations
- Te Araroa Trail provision for tents
- Persistent problem areas cannot be remedied by resolution
 - Kowharewa Bay, Woolleys Bay, Ocean Beach, Ruakaka,
 Wellington's Bay, Tamaterau

Aggregated enforcement instances and CRM complaints






Freedom camping survey


- Facebook campaign
 02 22 June 2020
- 1,329 survey responses

Themes:

- self-containment
- support local campgrounds
- cost to ratepayers







- Impact of Covid-19
 - Domestic tourism
 - Is the bylaw adequate for protecting public health and safety?
 - Chance to reassess tourism industry
- Local economy
 - Economic benefits of freedom camping not fully captured
 - 73% of freedom campers did not spend any nights in Whangarei District and left the same day they arrived.
 - Impact on commercial campgrounds




National level developments

- Responsible Camping Working Group
- Permissive approach in the Freedom Camping Act
 2011 likely to remain
- MBIE to become a national authority to set and enforce requirements for self-contained vehicles

Other councils:

- Grey District Council starting bylaw review
- Manawatu finalizing bylaw review
- Kaikoura adopted a new bylaw in 2019





Uncertainty creates opportunities as well as challenges



- MBIE funding uncertain post Covid-19
- Covid-19 restrictions on tourism
- Issue of vehicle dwellers and homelessness out of scope of bylaw.


Opportunities






Permanently living in a vehicle

- Permanently living in a vehicle is not "camping" for the purposes of the Bylaw
- Out of scope of bylaw review
 - LGNZ guidance is to not use a bylaw to move on people who are genuinely homeless
- Joined-up agency approach to homelessness:
 - Council (in a facilitating role to bring the parties together)
 - Ministry for Social Development
 - Housing New Zealand
 - Salvation Army (or equivalent entity)
 - Iwi social providers





Growth scenario

- Demand bounces back due to domestic tourism or increases as borders open up
- Changes to bylaw needed to manage demand


