Long Term Plan 2021-31 Consultation Document

Dear Sheryl Mai and Councillors, Whangarei District Council

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the Long Term Plan 2021-31 Consultation Document (LTP). I'd like to congratulate all those responsible for putting this together particularly in terms of the detail disclosed, and the clarity of presentation.

There are three areas I'd like to comment on in particular: sustainability and climate change; the proposed Oruku development; and housing.

Sustainability and climate change

I strongly support as a minimum Option 2 outlined in the LTP of putting \$7.4m of new funding towards climate change mitigation and adaptation and waste management.

Climate change is with us now and all the signs are that its effects will only worsen in the future. The likelihood of extreme weather events (such as we have already experienced) in addition to sea level rise poses significant and immediate risk to many ratepayers, including but not limited to those in vulnerable coastal areas, river and low-lying plain areas, farmers affected by drought as well as flooding, and those others affected by water shortage in times of drought (including urban ratepayers). We have already experienced the impacts of a "once-in-500-year-storm" and a drought that saw severe restrictions not only on urban water use but on access to bore supply.

I believe there is sufficient evidence of probable climate change impacts for these risks to be more fully incorporated in the LTP and for consultation and work with the various communities to proceed apace. In these circumstances the higher level of funding of Option 2 seems appropriate.

The proposed Oruku Development

I do not believe funding should be committed to this proposed development without publicly-available in-depth analysis of the risks and probable returns to the local community. Although funding of \$60m is a "gift" from central government, it also carries with it a commitment of \$23m to be funded by debt at ratepayer expense.

I have the following issues with this:

- I do not see anywhere in the LTP or its supporting documents a breakdown of where
 ratepayer money would be used. I note that the \$23m would be allocated to "the related
 infrastructure, things like roading, stormwater and wastewater networks". At the very least, I
 would like to know how much of this is additional to work that will need to be carried out in any
 event.
- The project places an extremely heavy burden of risk on ratepayers: "It is proposed that Council take ownership of this construction project, which will see the Oruku Landing Conference and Events Centre built as a Council-owned community asset. This means Council will manage the construction costs and take responsibility for the long-term maintenance and depreciation of the facility. This will also mean that Council would be responsible for any liability or cost overruns."

- Where are the projections of facility use and on what assumptions are they based? Is a
 convention centre this far north with significant travel costs really likely to attract clients with a
 choice of more centrally-located sites?
- I am concerned about the possibility of this project crowding out others which I believe to be more directly beneficial to ratepayers, in particular a new theatre at Forum North.

Housing

The LTP states "housing is a key issue for us" yet confines its discussion to "We have enough land and infrastructure to meet future demands for housing. But we have a limited choice of housing options and affordability is a severe issue. With most of the housing decisions made at the central government level, we have a supporting role to play here."

(I note however that the WDC is involved in the provision of pensioner housing, with \$5.1m budgeted for renewal and maintenance for existing housing, plus \$2m in the first four years for new housing. How much housing can be provided for \$2m?)

Housing is indeed a crucial issue in the Whangarei District area, as it is for the rest of New Zealand. The impacts of insufficient and sub-standard housing are serious and pervasive and include:

- Physical and emotional hardship which, along with the damaging impacts on those directly
 affected, place increased load on health and social services
- · Reduced capacity to participate in the social and cultural life of communities
- Reduced capacity to find or sustain employment
- · Negative effects on childhood health, educational achievement, and social engagement
- Increased likelihood of engagement in personally and socially dysfunctional activity such as drug use and other criminal behaviour

These are issues of direct concern to all ratepayers, both urban and rural, and measures to mitigate the impacts are likely to have significant positive payoff. In these circumstances I would like to see much greater attention paid to the issue of housing in the LTP.

- What is the "supporting role" to be played by WDC?
- What resources will be devoted to it?
- Is there scope for action which moves beyond merely "supporting"?

I am writing this submission as an individual, ratepayer and farmer.

Yes, I wish to be heard in support of your submission please.

Annual Plan Feedback:

1. PROPOSED REGIONAL COMMUNITY CENTRE MULTIPURPOSE RECREATION AND INDOOR SPORTS FACILITY FOR ELDERLY & DISABLED IN NORTHLAND

WDC needs to provide space, land and buildings for this Project. My continued campaign for a Community Regional multipurpose facility, complex, centre and obviously my first option is the (ex-Countdown Building) for this Project as per my previous submissions to provide for the elderly and disabled and youth and mothers, grandparents have nowhere to go during the week, bad weather and during school holidays. Special Requirements and Facilities for more Disability Covered Carparking, Safe, Warm, Inviting Environment and in winter it is warm in summer it is cool and also that the seating is suitable for all elderly and disability people which is commonly overlooked by main stream facilities. No consultation for Elderly and disability people for new buildings for design and accessibility. Disappointed in the lack of consultation and no response to my letters, support letters and petition in 2014 with NRC & WDC in regard to the ex-Countdown Land & Building - the obvious extreme waste of ratepayers money with security, fencing and vacant building with maintenance and dangerous asbestos in roof for 4-5 years. Grey Power supports this Project. DPA Northland supports this Project. Regional Elderly & Disability Action Group in Northland supports this project and I have other letters of support for this Project. I believe that WDC Mayor and WDC current Councillors are seriously overlooking the concerns about future planning for Whangarei and Northland for the ever growing elderly and disabled population and the lack of facilities for public use in recreation, social and sports.

2. FIRES BANS

My opinion is and that of years with my farming experience is that fires need to be controlled and lit in the summer time because of the wood material being dry and less pollution when burnt and it brings rain. WDC need to have training and workshops for unskilled people who do not know how to light and manage a fire (eg, where to light it, how to light, how to control it and how to plan if it gets out of control). That the Fire Permits are taking too long to issue as the environment can change quickly and then I can not use it and also WDC Staff can cancel fire permits with no explanation. I am concerned that the Fire Trucks are being used as emergency response for car accidents which are occurring too often and Councils and Government are not funding these resources so when we need as rural, urban, lifestyle blocks or farmers need this resource or services they are not available.

3. KAURI DIE BACK

I asked at a meeting about Kauri Die Back where is it? The location and where on a map but have also been ignored and concerned that the information and data collected is not made public. I believe that the borer beetles because the kauri tree stick out above the bush and the tree is in the flight path of the beetle and they rest on the bark and branches and leave behind their eggs. Also I have seen this happening out in the farm where trees are dying and the beetles are killing other tree species as well this needs to be investigated as a real concern and could be the reason for Kauri Die Back.

4. ROADING

The WDC are currently doing road upgrading in the area but not sealing them which is waste time and ratepayers money as they quickly return to a worser state than before with more potholes and corrugated erosion. Concerned that Wrights Road, Pipiwai roadworks was a waste of time and money for dust control little bits and pieces when the entire road should been sealed at the same time.

5. WEEDS ON SIDE OF ROADS

I want to talk about weeds that are on the side of the road next to farm land. This is the responsibility of WDC to maintain road verges. Only when I complain does the WDC say it belongs to NRC and visa vera so someone needs to take responsibility. It is not the farm or land owner should be doing this and WDC should make this part of annual plan for management.

6. RUATANGATA COMMUNITY HALL

I asked for an extra street light on another pole which would shine for people with disability and elderly down the ramp – health & safety issues. The light has been changed but the new light is useless and needs to be moved as it isn't working. I have brought this up at WDC Have your Say Meeting and have had no action. The WDC is refusing to give the Community Hall Committee funding there has been no explanation in writing and we need this need actioned for WDC to support our community and local hall. WDC staff have indicated that the community own the hall but WDC gives funding to other Halls in the same situation but refuses to help our Hall.

7. GUMTOWN ROAD - CULVERTS TOO NARROW

I have repeatly asked that the Gumtown Road is reviewed and accessed as the road is too narrow and there needs to be extra culverts. The Grader Driver blocks the culverts.

8. TREE SPECIES & SELECTION FOR FUTURE PLANTING ON ROAD VERGES AND AREAS

I am concerned that the WDC is making unprofessional decisions about what species and type of trees are planted in public areas and near roads and buildings (eg, leaf fall blocking drains and causing flooding, kauri trees next to buildings, root bound trees pulling up footpaths & wastewater, stormwater, powerlines & fences, etc)

9. RUBBISH DUMPED ON SIDE OF ROADS

I have concerns about Rubbish Truck having unsecured loads which is spread over the roads and into the water tables and then will pollute the rivers and our Harbours.

10. DOG PARK

I would like to say I support the Dog Park but I believe that the drainage is overly excessive and expensive I think this needs to be investigated. Also that WDC should provide wider footpaths for people in wheelchairs with dogs.

I am appalled at the state of our rural roads, the standard of maintenance and upgrades is very poor or non existent. Trucks have advanced and increased in size, roads are not fit for purpose in 2021. Log trucks fall off roads often and livestock trucks throw stock from side to side in their pens on the badly designed corners with no camber. Modern trucks are a total mismatch to our goat track roads.

It is good to see you have allocated \$47m for sealing unsealed roads but sealed rural roads need upgrading also. I would like to see a higher standard of engineering of road alignment and camber and with corners straightened.

The benefits of better roads are safety and efficency of serving the farming community where the countries wealth comes from in the form of milk tankers, stock trucks, logs, fertiliiser and general deliveries more time effective and cost efficient.

In 1976, the then Whangarei City Council, with NORTAF (Northland Theatre and Arts Foundation Incorporated, now Creative Northland), agreed together to build Forum North. In that collaborative joining of forces, it was intended to include a second theatre of approximately 1000 seats with a fly tower ("lyric theatre").

A Lyric Theatre is:

- an acoustically superior theatre suitable for orchestral and choral works
- fixed seating with a closeness and intimacy between performers and audience with clear sightlines
- a "fly tower" above the stage so that scenery can be dropped easily onto the stage i.e. "flown in"
- proscenium arch
- sprung floor for dance
- orchestra pit
- adequate dressing rooms, rehearsal areas and undercover loading facilities
- complex sound system and control desk
- theatre lighting e.g. 200 spot and other lights
- complex specialist systems relating to lighting control (computer control desks), sound production, communication between backstage, front of house, orchestra pit, dressing rooms et cetera. Also the fly tower lifting system.

Preliminary plans were made, but public funding was not enough to build the "lyric theatre" so only the 350 seat Bougainville Theatre was built. It was always the intention to add the larger theatre at a future date, which currently has not happened.

Option 1 of the LTP 2021-31 includes:

- a. Oruku Landing Conference and Event Centre with focus on conference and conference events (\$23 million for infrastructure work around the project)
- b. Hihiaua Cultural Centre \$5 million. This facility has planned "natural outdoor seating" for staged events; and
- c. Forum North "improvements" (\$12 million). I understand this is effectively deferred remedial work. This work will not add a fly tower, or increase the seating capacity of the Capitaine Bougainville Theatre it will just remedy the deferred maintenance work required to bring the complex up to standard.

I would submit that the Council:

- put the building of the lyric theatre back into the LPT to be built at Forum North in addition to the three other projects;
- advance the construction date to commence shortly after the Council moves out of the Forum North complex;
- borrow the funds to build the theatre, and
- undertake the planned refurbishment of Forum North at the same time as the new theatre is built.

My reasons are:

a. Whangarei does not need yet another Events Centre such as the proposed Oruku Landing Conference and Events Centre. The Toll Stadium (now Semenoff Stadium) was forced on the public and touted as being an "Events Centre for all", but has always been nothing more than a stadium for Rugby. The proposed OLCEC will not have adequate facilities for the long-awaited larger theatre space, however much it is touted that it will. Sports facilities have been greatly supported by the Council over the years. In contrast, there has been little significant arts infrastructure built by the WDC since the building of Forum North in 1979-80 (except \$3.3 million contribution to the Hundertwasser project plus surrounding infrastructure, and refurbishment of the area occupied by the Whangarei Art Museum). There is a clear imbalance through the past four decades by the WDC supporting sports facilities ahead of arts facilities.

- b. The Hihiaua Cultural Centre will not be affected by an 850 seat lyric theatre at Forum North.
 Both are designed for different performances, and so have different capabilities. The Hihiaua cultural Centre has planned outdoor natural seating.
- c. An 850 seat lyric theatre will take approximately 5 years to design and build. If not included in the present LTP, the earliest date will likely be 60 years from the date the first decisions were made to build the theatre in 1976. The reasons for the theatre are now more valid. Whangarei has missed out on many decades of utilisation of the planned facility. This is unacceptable.
- d. The Capitaine Bougainville Theatre does not have sufficient seats for it to be economically viable for **larger** performances to come to Whangarei e.g. dance companies, travelling musical shows, the New Zealand Symphony orchestra, the New Zealand Ballet Company, the New Zealand Opera Company etc. The Te Kotahitanga (Exhibition) Hall does not have acceptable staging and other requirements for those shows. Consequently, those productions do not come to Whangarei, which has been the case for 40 years, depriving 2 generations of children being deprived of these experiences. I cannot imagine that would be tolerated for an instant if sports facilities were involved. It was patently evident during 2020, that worldwide, people turned to the "arts" for comfort.
- e. Most, if not all, cities in New Zealand of Whangarei's size and stature have a large theatre available to their communities. Whangarei District's population is expected to reach 100,000 this year.
- f. WDC has commissioned numerous reports over the years, from the initial 1976 Auckland University Report to the 2020 Jasmax Report, all of which have confirmed the need for the "lyric" style theatre.
- g. There is no better time than now to borrow money to build the much-needed 850 seat lyric theatre.

Section of Beach Road, Onerahi, is dangerous for pedestrians

The section of Beach Road, from the Onerahi Yacht Club to Hill St is extremely dangerous. The road is narrow and barely wide enough for two vehicles to pass each other, especially for large trucks and cars towing boats. It is potentially dangerous for pedestrians because this road finishes at the sea wall and there is no footpath for people and their families.

The WDC has created a well-used, safe, shared path from Beach Road, along the Waimahanga Track and Riverside Drive, to the Town Basin. <u>Many more people are using Beach Road</u> because there is now a safe pathway. It is great to see people of all ages enjoying the area every day - walking, running, cycling and taking their dogs for a walk, families with babies in prams and young children riding their bikes. Many people like to complete a circuit of Beach Rd and have to use a dangerous, narrow road with no footpath to do this.

<u>Frequently reckless drivers choose to use Beach Road to drive as fast as they can</u>, sometimes with groups of cars. It is frightening when cars speed past and are dangerously close to you. These drivers have a complete disregard for the safety of people and their families who enjoy walking along this scenic part of our harbour.

Many species of birds live in this area. I regularly walk around Beach Road and I frequently witness cruel drivers deliberately mowing down flocks of birds, killing and maiming them. Many people do not realise that some species like the Red-billed Gull is native to NZ and their numbers are in decline. Caring people do not like to witness this deliberate cruelty. This creates additional work for the Native Bird Recovery Centre volunteers. Traffic calming measures would slow drivers down and make Beach Road safer for all bird life too.

The WDC has encouraged people to use this beautiful area and now needs to complete the circuit of Beach Road and make it safer for people and birdlife.

Suggestions - make Beach Road:

- a one way street from the Onerahi Yacht Club to Hill St
- continue the concreted shared path to Hill St
- put in traffic calming measures from the Raurimu Road intersection to Hill St

The long term plan 2021-2031 is a document that demonstrates lack of equity for Māori. In the document which is fifty one pages in length there are only two pages that acknowledge Māori, p.15 partnership with Maori which provides an explanation of the strategic partnership and the proposal of establishing Māori wards and p.26 Hihiaua cultural centre. There is no information about how these strategies will be developed and the projects or topics which might relate to these provisions. I find this unacceptable given that the explanation for all other planned approaches within the document are well articulated and scoped with strategies for the next ten years.

When reviewing this LTP it presents with a very economic focus which is important to the growth of Whangarei, but it should also be invigorated with the same approach in the areas of social and cultural.

The LTP is very explicit in its description of the major projects that will be developed over the next 10 years. When i peruse this information i find these projects do not include or even make mention of provisions for Māori. I would like to see in the LTP more equity for Maori around issues which are relevant to Maori including rating of Māori land, papakainga provision, marae development, environmental issues, Māori wellbeing. I acknowledge the work presented in the LTP and I would like to see greater equity and representation for Maori within this plan.

We'd like to patronise other city centre places too please. The new Kensington Hub is a case in point - now there are a myriad food outlets, the parking is mostly taken up with young people popping in to these shops, whereas older people needing access to the pharmacy, medical hub and post office, are forced to park far further away than sometimes physical ability allows, or go home and come back another day.

Re: Funding for Community Desexing

In accordance with the SPCA Strategy 2019-2029, the organisation is looking at reducing the number of unwanted animals needing the care and support of SPCA. By 2029, SPCA aims to halve the number of animals needing help and this can be achieved in part through SPCA's National De-sexing Programme which will provide a humane and effective way to reduce the number of unwanted cats and dogs.

SPCA snip'n' chip

Desexing is a key component of Responsible Pet Ownership. The owned companion animal population of New Zealand is estimated to include 1.2 million companion cats and 851,000 dogs, of which approximately 146,000 cats and 221,000 dogs are not desexed and some animals may have already had a litter before desexing occurred. The main barriers to desexing of owned companion cats are cost (27%), feeling it is unnecessary (23%), and not considering it a priority (21%). For dogs the three main barriers are feeling it is unnecessary (27%), wanting to breed the animal (26%), and cost (20%). These barriers have remained largely unchanged over the previous decade. To overcome these barriers SPCA's National Desexing Programme aims to address these key barriers through the provision of readily-accessible low-cost desexing and education focused on the importance and appropriate timing of desexing companion cats and dogs. SPCA has an important role in providing a preventative, 'top of the cliff' approach, to addressing the unwanted and stray animal population of New Zealand and are reaching out to other stakeholders to support this important strategy.

In December 2020, SPCA launched our low cost desexing programme Snip 'n' Chip into the Far North Region and the interest and uptake of the programme has been phenomenal. This campaign is the largest stand- alone campaign SPCA has ever undertaken and is on target to desex 4000 cats by the end of June 2021. In order to make a real impact on the number of unwanted animals in the community, this effort has to be repeated annually, and to include dogs, if we are to achieve our target by 2029. SPCA is therefore requesting funding from the Whangarei District Council to assist us to expand and continue running this programme for the foreseeable future.

SPCA is committed to reducing the number of unwanted animals in the Far North Region so any funding SPCA receives to support this work will be used to desex, microchip and register the microchip with Companion Animals New Zealand. SPCA will bear all administrational and marketing costs, the funding will be exclusively expended in the Whangarei District Council areas and will be fully accounted for once the funding has been spent.



SPCA is aware that the Whangarei District Council is currently taking submissions for your 2021-2031 Long Term Plan, and therefore would be very grateful for your consideration on our request for funding to support our community de-sexing programme. SPCA will be happy to answer any questions you may have on our plan.

The AGEFC submission recognises the common concerns of communities across Whangarei and neighbouring jurisdictions, and supports the collaborative work by different councils in the Northland/Auckland ICWP on GMOs

AGEFC would like to see the existing precautionary and prohibitive GE/GMO policy of council (WDC) retained and strengthened (to address the risks of gene edited organisms, which are GMOS, and to address Climate Change) in the new Long Term Plan.

GE/GMOs issue

AGEFC support the councils precautionary and prohibitive GE/GMO provisions/ policies/ rules in the operative WDC District Plan (as a result of successful GE/GMO plan change #131) and current (operative) Long Term Plan 2018-28.

This reflects producer, ratepayer and residents wishes and aspirations, sets council policy direction, helps protect our existing valuable GE/GMO free status, as well as financial/ budgetary requirements.

AGEFC- and communities concerned for regulation of GE would like to thank council for its work in the Northland/ Auckland InterCouncil Working Group on GMOS

As with the Auckland Plan's section AUP E37 precautionary approach and important cost-recovery policies, it is important that you protect Ratepayers from exposure to the financial risk of GMO use.

This responds to deficiencies in the HSNO Act including inadequate liability provisions and no mandatory requirement for the EPA to take a precautionary approach to outdoor GE/GMO applications.

This protection from costs in the absence of commercial insurance is even more important given budget challenges from Covid-19.

AGEFC support the Plan addressing the risks of any outdoor GE/GMOs experiments/ field trials/ releases to our biosecurity, unique biodiversity, wider environment, existing GM/GMO free primary producers, food sovereignty, economy, Hua Parakore, cultural values, and the public health.

Please retain and enhance/strengthen the precautionary and prohibitive GE/GMO policy in the new/ updated Long Term Plan (2021-28).

AGEFC support the current WDC Long Term Plan (LTP) and WDC's policy on GMOs – see page 18: https://www.wdc.govt.nz/files/assets/public/documents/council/plans/long-term-plan/long-term-plan-2018-2028.pdf.

"Policy and planning issues noted by Council

Genetically modified organisms

The topic of genetically modified organisms (GMOs) came up throughout the consultation period and as a result, Council wishes to confirm its ongoing commitment to policy work in this area. Council has adopted a precautionary approach to the management of biotechnology, in general and to GMO land uses in particular. It will continue to investigate ways of keeping our District free of GMOs until outstanding issues such as liability, economic costs and benefits, environmental risks and cultural effects are resolved. Together with other Northland and Auckland councils on the Inter-Council Working Party on GMO Risk Evaluation and Management Options, Council has committed to investigating possible local

and/or regional management of GMO land uses under the Resource Management Act. Any further costs in relation to appeals will be reported back to Council prior to proceeding."

This wording should be transferred to the new WDC LTP 2021-28 but updated to note that gene edited organisms are GMOs and also strictly controlled or banned in Whangarei District/ Northland.

AGEFC ask that the plan specifically mention in the new WDC LTP that GMOs (genetically modified organisms) now includes risky gene edited organisms (new CRISPR technique), and Gene Silencing Pesticides.

Gene edited organisms have been shown to have unexpected/unforseen off target adverse effects and should not be allowed in NZ. The Civil Society Working Group on Gene Drives have produced a briefing on gene drives

Gene Silencing Pesticides are an emerging risk.

— Tree protection for all native vegetation and mature exotic trees and plant more trees in carparks and streets to limit the heat from concrete and asphalte. Plant more trees in public spaces

-creation of more spaces for young people, more "only bike" road -create more safety around the town basin playground close to the river and carpark -District council to buy land or use district council land to build innovative simple habitations involving young unemployed people to provide a roof for each family who needs it, in a system renting buying. Some very poor cities in south of Spain have created projects that could inspire us. Nobody can claim to be happy in this town if some of us cant count on the basic : food and a roof . It does not make sense that families have to leave town to go north because more people move to Whangarei from Auckland. Poverty in Whangarei is a reality that we , as a community must face, and deal with as a priority .It is a responsibility for all of us.

2– IMPLEMENT AN IMMEDIATE MORATORIUM ON ALL AERIAL AND ROADSIDE SPRAYING WITH TOXIC CHEMICAL PESTICIDES.

Since the 1920s there has been strong scientific evidence about the adverse effects of toxic pesticides on the environment and all life forms, yet NZ is still using highly hazardous pesticides that have been banned in other countries.

It is a well-documented fact that pesticides adversely affect the respiratory systems (among a long list of other symptoms) and that pesticides weaken the immune system of all life forms.

Given that Japan has recently rejected NZ honey on the basis of containing only traces of glyphosate, I believe it is only reasonable to ask our government: "What do the Japanese know that we don't?"

NZ is relying on 'safety data' provided by the very industry that is making billions of dollars on selling their products. If NZ doesn't have the funding for independent research, we should be looking for advice from better informed sources, like the United Nations. Blanket spraying of 'undesirable' plants, as in aerial and roadside spraying, is proven to be not only dangerous and unproductive, but also financially inefficient, wasting our tax dollar. Indiscriminate pesticide spraying is creating very costly problems, such as erosion, pollution of the waterways and serious health issues for humans, live-stock and wildlife. Pesticide poisoning is linked to cancer, endocrine disruption, reproductive effects, neurotoxicity, kidney and liver damage, birth defects, and developmental changes in a wide range of species.

The continued and indiscriminate use of toxic pesticides is a breach of one of our most basic human rights – the right to health!

On this basis, I believe it is our right that we ask all our government agencies to exercise the precautionary principle and place an immediate moratorium on Glyphosate and all other HHPs !

MAINTENANCE, WHICH ARE REGENERATIVE, SUSTAINABLE AND COULD BRING

MANY PERMANENT JOBS INTO OUR COMMUNITIES, IF THE ROADSIDE

MAINTENANCE CONTRACTS WERE ASSIGNED TO EACH INDIVIDUAL COMMUNITY. Objectives:

Minimizing the pollution of our waterways and environment by highly hazardous pesticides/herbicides, by practicing integrated roadside maintenance.

Replacing non-targeted herbicide sprays and destructive slashing with the MOLD method (method-of-least-disturbance).

Restoring our ecosystems by replacing weeds along roadsides with native vegetation (or beneficial non-native plants), to stabilize the soil, prevent erosion, enhance and promote biodiversity and provide habitat/shelter/food for wildlife.

Promoting the long-term financial benefit for ratepayers by reducing the costs of roadside maintenance.

Providing people in our community with a permanent income, by gaining the contract for roadside maintenance as a 'community business'.

Job offers include: landscapers, arborists, ecologists, equipment service team; botanists, nursery managers, administration staff and educational program managers (to share the learning process and knowledge with the next generation).

3- GE/GMOS ISSUE

I support the councils precautionary and prohibitive GE/GMO provisions/ policies/ rules in the operative WDC District Plan and previous Long Term Plan, which addresses: the risks of any outdoor GE/GMOs experiments/ field trials/ releases to our biosecurity, unique biodiversity, wider environment, existing GM/GMO free primary producers, food sovereignty, economy, Hua Parakore, cultural values, and the public health. Please retain and enhance the precautionary and prohibitive GE/GMO policy in the Long Term Plan. I urge you to specifically mention that GMOs (genetically modified organisms) now includes risky gene edited organisms/ CRISPR). Gene edited organisms have been shown to have unexpected/unforseen off target adverse effects and should not be allowed in NZ.

I also oppose any outdoor use of risky and controversial "gene drive"(a sterility technique that has grave risks).

PROPOSAL4- PINE FOREST PLANTATIONS TO BE CLASSED AS A 'NOT PERMITTED ACTIVITY' OF LAND USE WITHIN A RADIUS OF A MINIMUM OF 40KM FROM THE COASTS AND ANY RESIDENTIAL DEVELOPMENTS. Current permits and leases in these areas should not be renewed. Ideally, the ill-conceived plan to mitigate climate change by planting pine trees should be immediately revised. Consideration should be given to transition the existing pine forests into native tree forestry, using the pines as shade and shelter, instead of felling them. This has been successfully trialled.

The adverse effects of pine plantations on the environment and human health are numerous and well documented. The severe noise and air pollution and traffic congestions

associated with logging, which often last for several months, severely compromise the wellbeing of the residential communities (human and wildlife). Not only do pine trees cause soil acidification and decrease the water flow in streams; the practice of clear felling at logging harvest stage, often on steep slopes, exposes soil to rains and erosion, with resultant heavy silting of streams which in turn smothers important native invertebrate larvae, resulting in the destruction of the freshwater and ocean aquatic ecosystems.

PINE TREES ARE ALSO ONE OF THE BIGGEST CONTRIBUTORS TO AIR POLLUTION.

They give off gases that react with airborne chemicals, many of which are produced by human activity, creating tiny, invisible particles that muddy the air. The small particles influence cloud formation and rainfall, and affect climate and human health. In the United States each year, 50,000 premature deaths from heart and lung disease are attributable to excess concentrations of aerosols. What complicates matters is that the atmosphere is a highly oxidizing, highly reactive place, which means that aerosols are transformed very rapidly into particles that can have completely different chemical compositions.

New bylaws and resources urgently needed for the effective management of stray and abandoned cats and kittens in our community.

I work for Kainga Ora (Housing NZ), Whangarei, as a Tenancy Manager. I frequently see stray and abandoned cats and kittens when I visit my clients and can see the damage they are doing to residents' properties. I am also concerned about the health risks for our clients and their young children, created by large numbers of unowned and unwanted cats and kittens.

Our clients frequently complain to us about the numbers of stray and abandoned cats and kittens on their properties and the problems they create. These cats do not belong to the residents and all the neighbours know that they are strays. The residents are concerned and frustrated as the number of unwanted and unowned cats and kittens is increasing, because there is currently no organisation in Whangarei that is able to help them with this problem.

The Whangarei SPCA is not obligated to take in stray cats - their priority is vulnerable, sick and injured animals, and medical emergencies. In January 2019, the Whangarei SPCA made several changes. They have taken away their dog/puppies and cat/kittens 'drop in' boxes at the SPCA centre in Kioreroa Road. These used to be available when the centre is closed. They have stopped lending humane live capture traps to the public for trapping semi-wild or simply frightened domestic cats. They no longer accept stray cats from the local community either. These measures, along with Whangarei's rapidly growing human population, means increasing numbers of unowned and unwanted stray and abandoned cats and kittens in every suburb.

Stray and abandoned cats and kittens cause many problems and much anxiety for our clients. Some residents respond with kindness, sadly others are cruel and get rid of them any way they can. The majority of people do not like seeing these animals suffer and find it distressing to see desperate, skinny, starving cats and kittens in their gardens and on their doorstep all year round.

Our clients complain about stray and abandoned cats and kittens:

- · coming into their homes
- causing flea infestations in their carpets
- · causing young children to get skin infections from flea bites
- · spraying on their carpets and furniture

- stealing food off kitchen benches and tables
- breeding and fighting under their homes
- damaging insulation under their houses when female cats use it as a safe place to keep and raise young kittens
- dying under their homes creating a putrid smell for several months
- breeding in their garages and garden sheds
- · spraying on the outside walls of their homes, garages and fences
- · leaving faeces in their gardens
- · eating their pets' cat/s and/or dog/s food
- fighting with their pet cats and often causing them injury
- spreading diseases like cat flu and feline aids to their pet cats/kittens
- · creating unnecessary expensive vet bills
- causing suffering and sometimes slow premature deaths for pet cats/kittens when their owners cannot afford expensive vet bills

Most of our clients are beneficiaries or have low incomes. They often have limited resources, support and money, so are unable to resolve the problem themselves. They are dependent on community organisations to help them, but unfortunately, these organisations do not exist in Whangarei.

I would like the WDC to help solve this problem:

- Introduce new bylaws mandating that all companion cats are de-sexed, microchipped and registered (on NZCAR the NZ Companion Animal Register) by 6 months of age - a once in the cat's lifetime cost. Over time, this would help reduce the number of stray cats in our community.
- Financially contribute to 'Snip n Chip' or 'Snip, Chip n Trip' programmes each year, involving either the Whangarei SPCA and/or local vets. This would provide subsidised de-sexing, microchipping and registering of cats for people on low incomes. This is already available in other areas of NZ.

MANAGING GROWTH AND ALTERNATIVE TRANSPORT OPTIONS

Bike Northland supports WDC in its proposed management of growth and alternative transport options. The existing Kamo, Onerahi and Hatea Loop shared paths are valuable and useful assets to the city, linking many schools and public facilities, and providing routes for both recreation/exercise and commuting. The proposed extensions to Raumanga and Station Road will further improve opportunities for residents to use alternative modes of transport.

Significant funds have already been spent creating a new carpark at Pohe Island and revitalising the skate park. Funding has also been committed to the destination playground, and Bike Park. The success of these projects will be measured in the level of use. It is essential that people can easily access these facilities.

The Whangarei shared path network is currently lacking effective connections between the Onerahi path, the Kamo path, and the proposed Raumanga path, especially in the central city precinct.

Bike Northland recommends priority be given to forming **shared path connections** as follows:

1. Te Matau a Pohe bridge to Bike Park hub (Area 2)

- This will allow access from the Hatea Loop to the Bike Park bike hub.
- It will provide additional options to Hatea Loop users, either extending their trip or as a variation, and help to relieve congestion on the loop.
- It will provide a clear connection to the Onerahi shared path from the Hatea Loop.
- Rough Order of Cost (ROC) for this connection is approximately \$250k.

2. Pohe Island central carpark to the Bike Park hub (Area 3)

- This will provide access between the central car park and the Bike Park hub.
- It will allow for easy movement between the different projects on Pohe Island; Skate park, destination playground, Bike Park, dog park, sports fields.
- It will provide a clear connection to the Onerahi shared path from the northern part of the Hatea Loop.
- Rough Order of Cost (ROC) for this connection is approximately \$175k.

3. Multiple linkages between Kamo, Hatea loop/Onerahi and Raumanga shared paths.

- The provision of links for active modes of transport between the Kamo (North), Onerahi (East) and Raumanga (South) shared paths is essential to the connectivity of Whangarei. We are aware that several link route options have been suggested, and all have merit according to the destination and purpose of the user.
- Bike Northland recommends that the council provide a network of links that:
 - (a) Join the 3 shared paths directly to the central city, so that users can conveniently and safely complete their journey to the CBD, then can easily get onto a different path e.g. transitioning from East to South via CBD, and.
 - (b) Join each shared path separately and directly to both other paths so that users can transition directly from one to another without deviating through the CBD. e.g. go directly from East to North, or East to South, or North to South via direct routes.
- Bike Northland is of the view that both (a) and (b) are required to optimise the potential of the shared path network.

4. Paths to Maunu (southwest) and Tkipunga (northeast)

• There is a substantial and increasing population in the suburban and city fringe areas serviced by Maunu Rd, and Mill Rd, and future development should link these areas into the network

REVITALISING OUR CITY CENTRE

Bike Northland supports the improvements to James and John Streets and recommends that facilitating access into the city centre via active modes, and providing convenient destinations in the form of bike storage racks would both assist in the goal of revitalising the city centre.

Facilitating access should include the provision of safe and convenient links between the city's shared paths and the CBD, and linking the shared paths together via the CBD, as detailed previously in this submission.

Managing conflict of use through what are primarily pedestrian precincts, or through streets dominated by motor vehicles is always a challenge. This could be achieved in the short term using reduced speeds and painted or sign-posted routes for cyclists to use when crossing through the city centre.

Bike Northland Inc. supports the further development of cycling and walking infrastructure in Te Tai Tokerau / Northland, for the purposes of enhancing commuter and recreational transport, enhancing health and wellbeing outcomes, contributing to the local economy and reducing environmental footprint.

The shared goals of Bike Northland, Waka Kotahi and Northlands' Councils in cycling infrastructure would benefit from the activation of the network investments on a regional scale. Bike Northland seeks the NTA's support for this proposal to fund Bike Northland to facilitate and enhance the above outcomes. The proposed role would optimise implementation of the vast amount of infrastructure planned, ensuring uptake of the network.

Bike Northland seeks shared funding from the local government organisations of Northland for a threeyear term. The purpose of the funding is to provide industry representation, leadership and stewardship to develop Northland's biking infrastructure for recreational and commuter activities.

The funding arrangement proposed by Bike Northland is:

- Whangarei District Council, \$25,000 p.a. for 3 years
- Far North District Council, \$15,000 p.a. for 3 years
- ✤ Kaipara District Council, \$15,000 p.a. for 3 years
- Northland Regional Council, \$35,000 p.a. for 3 years
- ✤ Bike Northland, \$25,000¹ p.a. for 3 years
- The main aim is to shift movements from on-road by developing off-road recreational cycleways connecting communities and to enhance and create bike parks. Many of these are suitable as shared facilities for walking and cycling and mobility access.
- BN will promote the programme and may lead some individual projects.
- Generally, BN would assist and facilitate other trusts and community organisations, including lwi, to develop and maintain tracks and parks around Northland.
- BN will ensure there is a centralised easily accessible information source about bike tracks and facilities around Northland.
- BN will provide technical and fund sourcing skills where required.
- A key objective of BN is to assist in the development of the **Twin Coast Discovery Cycleway**. This is 660km of (ultimately) off-road core route around Northland connecting Mangawhai to itself, the long way round,

Mangawhai-Lang's Beach-Waipu Cove-Waipu-Ruakaka-One Tree Point-(links to Whangarei City on Waka Kohatu highway development) One Tree Point-Whangarei Heads-Pataua-Ngunguru-(links to Whangarei City)-Tutukaka Coast-Whananaki-Helena Bay-Bay of Islands-Opua-(links to Russell-Paihia-Waitangi-Kerikeri)-Kawakawa-Moerewa-Kaikohe-Okaihau-Horeke-Rawene-Opononi-Waimamaku-Donnelly's Crossing-Kaihu-Dargaville-Te Kopuru-Ruawai-Paparoa-Kaiwaka-Mangawhai.

The *Opua-Horeke* section (Pou Herenga Tai Twin Coast Cycle Trail) is already complete. Other smaller sections are in various stages of development by community groups.

¹ Bike Northland's share is donated time by the Board based upon 1 hour each board member per week costed at \$100/hour.

Branches off this core route are also desired, such as the examples given above of linking *One Tree Point* to *Whangarei City*, *Whangarei City* to *Ngunguru*, and *Opua* to *Kerikeri*.

Extending the network into the Far North to reach Cape Reinga is also desirable.

Mangawhai is a strategic hub. To the south, the network is already planned and advancing from Mangawhai connecting *Matakana* and *Puhoi*.

This proposal would enable at least a 0.5 EFT role, supported by BN board members, focused on:

- Identifying, engaging and supporting key community groups and trusts as partners to develop and take ownership of trail sections.
- Facilitating funding acquisitions for network development.
- Leading, coordinating and integrating the efforts of partner groups.
- Developing relationships with tourism and commercial sectors.
- Developing relationships with other stakeholders including state and local government health, road safety and transport organisations.
- Developing and maintaining a centralised, accurate and accessible database of Northland's available cycle trail network.

Central Otago, South Canterbury and Hauraki cycle trail networks have proven to be very successful and have brought considerable financial benefit to communities in accommodation, cafes, restaurants, attractions and services providers.

Northland has a fantastic story to be told and enjoyed. The Twin Coast Discovery Cycle Route will have benefits that are significantly higher than the cost to construct the network, however these can only be realised when there is a substantial connected network.

The few existing successful tracks and facilities need more visibility and are not yet numerous enough.

New bylaws and resources urgently needed for the management of 'lost' and abandoned cats and kittens that are suffering from starvation and cruelty; damaging our environment; and creating problems for residents and businesses in our community.

I am a resident in the Whangarei district. I am aware that people in all suburbs have problems with 'lost' and abandoned cats and kittens, whether it be one or two cats or colonies of 20-30. These unowned and unwanted cats and kittens create many different problems and cause unnecessary anxiety, work and expense for residents and businesses, and damage to native wildlife.

Lost and abandoned cats and kittens are:

1. Suffering:

 from chronic dehydration, starvation, constipation, tooth decay, flea and worm infestations, disease and untreated injuries

2. Victims of a disturbing range of cruelty and abuse

3. Creating a nuisance and problems for residents:

- spreading diseases to pets such as cat flu and feline aids
- getting into fights and causing injuries to pets creating unnecessary and expensive vet bills
- breeding in garages, garden sheds and under homes damaging the insulation

4. A health and hygiene issue:

- eating pets' food, and stealing people's food from kitchen benches and tables
- causing flea infestations in carpets, and skin infections from flea bites
- interrupting sleep when fighting and mating
- dying under homes in inaccessible places creating a revolting smell
- spraying inside homes damaging carpets and furniture
- spraying on fences and outside walls creating a gross smell all year round
- leaving faeces in gardens a health hazard for young children
- carry toxoplasmosis contagious to immune comprised people

5. Creating daily anxiety and distress in kind and caring residents:

- who hate seeing tiny, vulnerable, kittens that are skinny and starving, often with the mother cat desperately looking for food
- who have sick, malnourished and sometimes injured adult and juvenile cats hanging around, many with eye infections from untreated cat flu
- who know these cats have no future and there is no help available

6. Damaging our environment:

- predating on native species birds, small mammals, lizards and insects .
- competing with native species for food and water resources
- spreading diseases such as toxoplasmosis

7. Creating a nuisance for business owners:

- shoppers seeing starving cats and kittens eating out of rubbish bins
- employees taking time off work to take boxes of kittens found at their workplace to the SPCA
- cats breeding out the back of cafes, restaurants and supermarkets

The SPCA prioritises sick and injured animals and is not obligated to accept 'lost' cats and kittens. In January 2019, the Whangarei SPCA removed both their 'drop in' boxes for dogs/puppies and cats/kittens for out of hours use. They no longer lend humane live capture traps for catching semi-wild or simply scared pet cats. They do not accept 'stray' cats from the community any more. This means the number of 'lost' cats and kittens will rapidly escalate.

I would like the WDC to help solve this problem:

- 1. Introduce new bylaws mandating that all companion cats are de-sexed, microchipped and registered (on NZCAR the NZ Companion Animal Register) by 6 months of age - a once in the cat's lifetime cost.
- 2. Provide and financially contribute to subsidised de-sexing, microchipping and registering programmes throughout year for people on low incomes. Some councils in NZ already provide this service by working with their local vet clinics and/or SPCA.

Over time, both these measures would help reduce the number of lost and abandoned cats and kittens in the community. Mandatory de-sexing would also reduce the number of unwanted cats and kittens taken to cat shelters. Mandatory microchipping and registering would enable many lost cats and kittens to be reunited with their owners.

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WDC 202/ Submission: New bylaws needed for mandatory desexing and microchipping of cats in the Whangarei area.

There is a huge problem with stray, lost and abandoned cats in the Whangarei area. Many of our clients in both rural and urban domiciles report the presence of unowned and unwanted cats that appear and fight for food and territory, biting and injuring their own domestic pets in the process of day-to-day survival. Sometimes these cats are not seen, so this is the first evidence of their presence.

These unowned cats breed rapidly so the problem is an increasing one. A female cat can produce 2-4 litters a year with no particular breeding seasons. Each litter can number an average of 3-5 kittens that are sexually mature from 4 months old. De-sexing would stop this population growth. The local SPCA de-sexes many cats, but are becoming overwhelmed by the sheer numbers of unowned and unwanted cats.

Stray, lost and abandoned cats and those not adequately fed decimate wild bird populations. With the aims for a predator-free New Zealand by 2050 it is essential to have some effective programs in place to control the populations of these very efficient hunters in our extensive bush and native flora areas.

Microchipping gives each cat a unique number. It is the size of a grain of rice implanted under the skin, like a vaccination, usually during the de-sexing procedure by a vet or vet nurse. Vet practice and SPCA staff use a microchip reader that scans the chips radio signal and detects the unique 16 digit number. The number is registered on a database that links the cat to the owner's details. Without the registration, the animal cannot be reunited with an owner. When a stray, lost or abandoned, sick or injured cat is presented to the vet, the lack of a microchip means that there are delays in diagnosis and treatment for the patient due to a lack of owner permission.

There is a worldwide movement towards the mandatory microchipping of cats: the UK and $\,{}^{\prime}$ Japan are currently considering new guidelines and it is compulsory in France, Belgium, Greece and some parts of Spain and Australia.

I would like to suggest the following solutions to the above problems:

1. Financially contribute to a Whangarei "Chip and snip" programme involving local vet practices. This would provide subsidized de-sexing, microchipping and registering of companion cats for people on benefits/pensions and low incomes. Garchard

I am a resident in the Whangarei district. I am aware that people in all suburbs have problems with 'lost' and abandoned cats and kittens, whether it be one or two cats or colonies of 20-30. These unowned and unwanted cats and kittens create many different problems and cause unnecessary anxiety, work and expense for residents and businesses, and damage to native wildlife.

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3. Creating a nuisance and problems for residents:

- spreading diseases to pets such as cat flu and feline aids
- getting into fights and causing injuries to pets creating unnecessary and expensive vet bills
- breeding in garages, garden sheds and under homes damaging the insulation

4. A health and hygiene issue:

- eating pets' food, and stealing people's food from kitchen benches and tables
- · causing flea infestations in carpets, and skin infections from flea bites
- interrupting sleep when fighting and mating
- dying under homes in inaccessible places creating a revolting smell
- spraying inside homes damaging carpets and furniture
- spraying on fences and outside walls creating a gross smell all year round
- leaving faeces in gardens a health hazard for young children
- carry toxoplasmosis contagious to immune comprised people

5. Creating daily anxiety and distress in kind and caring residents:

- who hate seeing tiny, vulnerable, kittens that are skinny and starving, often with the mother cat desperately looking for food
- who have sick, malnourished and sometimes injured adult and juvenile cats hanging around, many with eye infections from untreated cat flu
- who know these cats have no future and there is no help available

6. Damaging our environment:

- predating on native species birds, small mammals, lizards and insects
- competing with native species for food and water resources
- spreading diseases such as toxoplasmosis

7. Creating a nuisance for business owners:

- shoppers seeing starving cats and kittens eating out of rubbish bins
- employees taking time off work to take boxes of kittens found at their workplace to the SPCA
- · cats breeding out the back of cafes, restaurants and supermarkets

The SPCA prioritises sick and injured animals and is not obligated to accept 'lost' cats and kittens. In January 2019, the Whangarei SPCA removed both their 'drop in' boxes for dogs/puppies and cats/kittens for out of hours use. They no longer lend humane live capture traps for catching semi-wild or simply scared pet cats. They do not accept 'stray' cats from the community any more. This means the number of 'lost' cats and kittens will rapidly escalate.

I would like the WDC to help solve this problem:

- Introduce new bylaws mandating that all companion cats are de-sexed, microchipped and registered (on NZCAR the NZ Companion Animal Register) by 6 months of age - a once in the cat's lifetime cost.
- 2. Provide and financially contribute to subsidised de-sexing, microchipping and registering programmes throughout year for people on low incomes. Some councils in NZ already provide this service by working with their local vet clinics and/or SPCA.

Over time, both these measures would help reduce the number of lost and abandoned cats and kittens in the community. Mandatory de-sexing would also reduce the number of unwanted cats and kittens taken to cat shelters. Mandatory microchipping and registering would enable many lost cats and kittens to be reunited with their owners.

Despite being sent from my work email address, this is a submission from me in my private capacity. Due to my very heavy workload, I have not had much time to put into this submission, so make only a few short points:

- 1. This Council, as well as many before it, have failed to balance the books with the result that the net debt position of the Council is rapidly increasing. I was shocked to read in the LTP that the net debt is projected to increase from \$158.6m on 1 July 2021 to \$360.5m by 30 June 2031. This growth in debt (+127%) completely outstrips anticipated population growth (+15%). In the 2018-2028 LTP, the debt was projected to peak at \$242m so the latest predictions are basically a 50% increase on that despite it being just 3 years on. In my view, Council is being financially reckless and should cut expenditure, sell assets such as leasehold land, and increase rates in order for the net debt position not to blow out as is being forecast.
- It is obvious that Council needs to raise rates, and by probably more than it is suggesting. However, it also needs to be more financially disciplined in the way it spends money. A case in point is the extremely expensive new offices that it is building. There were much cheaper options available.
- 3. The relative rating burden is all wrong. There is no plausible justification for the huge difference in the differentials between commercial / industrial and residential. Whangarei DC must have one of the highest difference in such differentials in the entire country. Council is concerned about the dying inner city but then exacerbates the situation with its rating practices.
- 4. I think it is questionable whether the proposed new rating differential definition for commercial / industrial land complies with the Local Government (Rating) Act 2002.
- 5. I support the Council doing what it needs to get the Oruku Landing Conference and Events Centre built. This will bring in significant money and domestic (conference) tourism to the city.
- 6. A new theatre would be nice, but I don't think we can afford it at present. I think it should be put on the back burner.
- 7. With climate change, the Council should do the minimum necessary to meet its legislative requirements.

8. I do not think the Council should spend \$13m on improvements to James and John Streets. It would be better to tackle the inequitable rates and then, when there are enough businesses there, look at improvements. In my view the previous "improvements" in the area – such as the mixed walking road area – have not been a success.

BACKGROUND:

NSaPS includes, at executive committee level, representatives of three Maori Hapu groups who have knowledge of the mountain, hills and pa sites that still hold their ancestral names passed down from generations, and who claim customary rights over the lands referred to in this submission.

Efforts have been made by the Ngunguru community since 1965 to protect the natural, cultural and historic values of Ngunguru Sandspit and adjacent coastal land (called Whakareora) from inappropriate development, so it can be enjoyed, valued and cherished by future generations.

NSaPS was incorporated in 2007.

In 2011, 83 hectares of Ngunguru Sandspit was acquired by the Crown, leaving an area of 68.833 in private ownership comprising balance Sandspit (35.3830ha) and Whakareora (33.3500ha), together in this submission called "the Property".

Submissions have been made to Whangarei District Council by NSaPS in respect of Long Term and Annual Plans since 2002 seeking financial assistance to purchase Ngunguru Sandspit and Whakareora and seeking zoning protection against residential and other development.

In 2018, after an unsuccessful attempt to broker a further land exchange between the Crown and Todd Property Group ("Todd"), the Minister of Conservation recommended that NSaPS apply to Nature Heritage Fund (NHF) and other funders (including Whangarei District Council and Northland Regional Council) to raise funds to buy the Property.

NSaPS lodged a funding application with NHF, based on a valuation by registered valuer of \$3,000.000.00 (GST inclusive), and NHF (with a co - funder) agreed to provide funds so long as NSaPS could find the balance required to purchase the Property.

Whangarei District Council and Northland Regional Council were unable to provide funds because of other priorities at the time. Both however provided letters of support (see attached).

Letters of support have now also been provided by Department of Conservation and NHF (also attached).

In November 2019, before a purchase price could be negotiated with Todd the Property was sold to Templeton Commercial Limited, a wholly owned subsidiary of NZPropCo Investments Limited.

NSaPS has commenced new negotiations with NZPropCo Limited to purchase the Property.

COMMENTS:

NSaPS will re-apply to NHF and other funders to Purchase the Property at valuation, estimated to now be \$3,000,000.00 to \$3,500,000.00(GST inclusive).

In the event of a shortfall of funds NSaPS will again ask Whangarei District Council and Northland Regional Council to contribute funds, expected to be between \$100,000.00 and \$500,000.00(more or less) from each, dependent on valuation and other funds raised.

NSaPS requests that Whangarei District Council allocates funds in the 2020/2021 financial year to add to funds from NHF and other funding agencies to enable the Property to be purchased.

NSaPS urges the Whangarei District Council to allocate funds, so as to show leadership and commitment to help secure the whole of Ngunguru Sandspit and Whakareora, to finally secure this outstanding property for perpetuity.

The Property, once purchased would be used as a nature and landscape reserve, with a possible commercial facility (including a camping ground) to be operated jointly by interested parties (ie Tangata Whenua ,Department of Conservation and Councils).

I write to give the Department of Conservation's support to the Ngunguru Sandspit Protection Society's ('the Society') funding application, to purchase the southern portion of the Ngunguru Sandspit, including Whakareora Mountain.

The Department acquired the majority of the low lying sandspit in 2011 through a land exchange. That portion is now classified as a Scenic Reserve pursuant to the Reserves Act 1977.

The acquisition was a culmination of years of lobbying and effort by the Ngunguru Sandspit Protection Society, to protect and preserve this taonga. Their efforts in the lead up to the land exchange, and now again to protect the southern sections are to be commended.

The base of the sandspit (Whakareora), is a unique area of coastal forest whose type is unrecorded elsewhere in Northland. It contains the regionally uncommon kawaka, coastal kauri and black maire and represents a rare vegetation assemblage. It has important cultural values for Maori. It is also a key coastal landscape feature for the Tutukaka Coast. The area is vulnerable to development, due to its prominent position, access to the sea and high coastal property values.

The Department agrees that the best way to ensure the perpetual protection of this land is by way of purchase into public ownership and managed contiguously with the Scenic Reserve, with the Society and hapu. We have investigated options to contribute to the purchase of the properties through the Department's Land Acquisition Fund. Although there are limited funds available at this time, we offer our support to the Society, to help facilitate agreements and joint funding options where possible.

The Nature Heritage Fund (NHF) is a contestable Ministerial fund that was established in 1990. The fund is administered by an independent committee appointed by the Minister of Conservation. It is serviced by the Department of Conservation and receives an annual allocation of funds from the Government.

Since its establishment the NHF has protected over 340,000 ha of indigenous ecosystems through legal and physical protection (i.e. direct purchase or covenanting). The NHF's vision is to protect indigenous ecosystems that represent the full range of natural diversity originally present in the landscape, through the establishment of a sustainable and interacting system of protected areas.

The NHF Committee strongly supports the Ngunguru Sandspit Protection Society's (the Society) efforts to purchase and protect, as public land, the remaining freehold area of the Ngunguru Sandspit and an adjoining portion of the Whakereora Maunga. The protection of these areas would create a nationally significant ecological sequence, spanning estuarine systems, coastal dune land to coastal forest.

These areas are identified in the NHF's Northland Protection Strategy as being a priority for protection. They are important as they contain ecosystems types that are under-represented in New Zealand's protected lands. The purchase of these areas would complete the protection of the entire Ngunguru Sandspit.

Recently the NHF Committee assessed an application by the Society for funding to purchase the remaining freehold area of the Ngunguru Sandspit and an adjoining portion of Whakereora Maunga. The Minister of Conservation supported the Committee's recommendation that this application be declined, but that a future application for up to one quarter of the funding sought be welcomed, if the balance of funding was secured. Please note that the NHF currently has insufficient funds to entirely fund this purchase.

However, the NHF is working with a potential co-funder, who may be able to fund up to 45% of the amount the Society is seeking. The NHF is committed to keeping the Society informed of its discussions with the co-funder.

The Society continues to demonstrate its commitment and expertise through its active management of pest animals and plants on the Sandspit. The Society also works productively with other parties, including the Department of Conservation and the Whangarei District Council. The Society's dedication to the permanent protection of the Ngunguru Sandspit and adjoining areas is therefore obvious and enduring.

The Nature Heritage Fund Committee looks forward to continuing working with the Society, on the protection of these nationally significant areas.

- Introduce new bylaws mandating that all companion cats are de-sexed, microchipped and registered (on NZCAR the NZ Companion Animal Register) by 6 months of age - a once in the cat's lifetime cost.
- 2. Provide and financially contribute to subsidised de-sexing, microchipping and registering programmes throughout year for people on low incomes. Some councils in NZ already provide this service by working with their local vet clinics and/or SPCA.

<u>The section of Beach Road, from the Onerahi Yacht Club to Hill St is extremely dangerous</u>. The road is narrow and barely wide enough for two vehicles to pass each other, especially for large trucks and cars towing boats. It is potentially dangerous for pedestrians because this road finishes at the sea wall and there is <u>no footpath</u> for people and their families.

The WDC has created a well-used, safe, shared path from Beach Road, along the Waimahanga Track and Riverside Drive, to the Town Basin. <u>Many more people are using Beach Road</u> because there is now a safe pathway. It is great to see people of all ages enjoying the area every day - walking, running, cycling and taking their dogs for a walk, families with babies in prams and young children riding their bikes. Many people like to complete a circuit of Beach Rd and have to use a dangerous, narrow road with no footpath to do this.

<u>Frequently reckless drivers choose to use Beach Road to drive as fast as they can</u>, sometimes with groups of cars. It is frightening when cars speed past and are dangerously close to you. These drivers have a complete disregard for the safety of people and their families who enjoy walking along this scenic part of our harbour.

<u>Many species of birds live in this area</u>. I regularly walk around Beach Road and I frequently witness <u>cruel drivers deliberately mowing down flocks of birds, killing and maiming them</u>. Many people do not realise that some species like the Red-billed Gull is native to NZ and their numbers are in decline. Caring people do not like to witness this deliberate cruelty. This creates additional work for the Native Bird Recovery Centre volunteers. Traffic calming measures would slow drivers down and make Beach Road safer for all bird life too.

The WDC has encouraged people to use this beautiful area and now needs to complete the circuit of Beach Road and make it safer for people and birdlife.
