# **Submission on WDC Long Term Plan**

This submission on the Whangarei District Council (WDC) Long Term Plan (LTP) is on behalf of the Ruakaka Residents & Ratepayers Association.

The key points we would wish to make are:

- Proposed rates increases of 6.5% followed by 4.5% for the remaining nine years are too high
- Council should focus on delivering core services well; not on civic facilities that are not in high demand from ratepayers.

#### Rates increases

The proposal to increase rates by 6.5% next year does not reflect the ability of families and businesses to pay.

A 2.5% inflation adjustment each year reflects the historic inability of councils throughout New Zealand to manage cost effectively. No other business activity or individual has the luxury of being able to index their costs. Council staff should be obliged to deliver an efficiency dividend across each year of the plan.

It is difficult to see why a 2% catch up for last year is needed given that there is no apparent backlog in service delivery arising from that reduction.

The final 2% relates to service improvements. These should be pared back to what is essential to deliver core services. While it is pleasing to see debt levels remaining within prudent levels, much of the significant proposed increase in debt over the coming decade is due to non-essential projects.

Rates are a significant portion of annual housing costs. The proposed increase comes at a time when landlords are being pilloried for rent increases and first home buyers are stretched to their limit.

#### City centre

Many of the proposed projects are city-centric. Whangarei District is much larger than the city centre.

The city centre itself is looking quite tired with a number of vacant shops. Rather than upgrading amenities on James and John Streets as proposed, something else could be done to revitalise the retail area. We do not support the upgrading of James and John Streets as we see limited benefit from this considerable cost.

We oppose the proposed conference centre, notwithstanding the availability of central government funding. The need for such a facility is unclear, ongoing cost will fall on ratepayers and the centre comes with considerable business risk given competition from other cities in New Zealand. We would support a stand-alone theatre in the Forum North building but not a combined theatre/conference centre.

One option for the city centre is to tie the waterfront area more closely to the main shopping area. Wellington has a similar issue to Whangarei with a busy road limiting access. Wellington's Jervois Quay arterial road cuts off the waterfront from the city centre. This has been partially overcome by an art-themed walkway across Jervois Quay from the current council complex. The ability to move easily from Whangarei's shops to waterfront would significantly enhance the visitor experience.

## Roading

We support rural road resealing.

Our community continues to have concerns over the supervision of contractors. While complaints can be made to the council's CRM system concerning individual failures, there seems to be a general issue around the quality of workmanship.

We note the plan doesn't specifically cover the issue of renewals and the current state of council's infrastructure. While there is brief mention on page 16 that there are some knowledge gaps, particularly around stormwater, this is a key assumption in the LTP. For example, other councils are suffering significant costs and service failure as a result of aging and under-maintained assets. It would be useful to have a categoric statement in the final plan that, to the best of council's knowledge, the current state and likely state in ten years' time based on proposed expenditure is satisfactory. This would include water infrastructure as well.

#### Other matters

Previously agreed funding for the Ruakaka Sports Complex and Multi-Purpose Facility should be reinstated. The small amount of council funding is part of the overall funding package for this facility which has been secured. The facility will benefit the whole region for example as a regional centre for volleyball.

We support additional pensioner housing.

We support expenditure on climate change. We believe that the focus of this should be on prevention of coastal erosion. This should include One Tree Point and Tamure St. The 50 and 100 year erosion lines are concerning.

We believe the question of a replacement airport and its location could be pushed forward for several more years.

We wish to appear at the WDC's hearings on this plan.

# **Local Projects**

Ruakaka is a rapidly growing part of Whangarei District with the current population reaching 3,000. Planning over the next decade needs to recognise this rapid growth. Key projects the community is concerned about are:

## **Ruakaka Cemetry**

This is a valuable local project which has generally been supported by Council. But it needs some added effort to bring it to closure.

## One Lane Bridge to Ruakaka Beach

The recent Tsunami warning highlighted the congestion of a growing population and busy camp ground trying to move out of this bottleneck. At the same time others were attempting to get to the beach to evacuate loved ones. Delays over the busy summer-period are becoming common-place.

#### **Changing Rooms at Ruakaka Beach**

Ruakaka Beach is larger than Waipu and is an increasingly popular destination for anglers, holiday-makers and locals. We recognise that creating precedents is an issue but we are not in the same levels of demand as other Northland beaches. We now host an annual beach volleyball tournament and surf lifesaving championships as well as the summer influx of visitors.

#### Parking at Ruakaka Beach

Similar comments apply to parking at the beach. There is ample unformed parking at the beach which would be better utilised if sealed. There are up to 1,000 swimmers over the peak period and the summer peak is lasting longer than in the past.

#### **Boat Ramp at One Tree Point**

The rapid growth of the Ruakaka rohe is also placing significant pressure on the boat launching facilities at One Tree Point. The summer influx of visitors is creating traffic, road safety parking and capacity issues at the boat ramp. The ramp itself is unsatisfactory.

#### One Tree Point Sea Wall

Work is also overdue on this issue which has been well canvassed in the past.

Why?	I think one short sharp shock is better than a ignoring the shortfall til later, but I wonder if in "year one" is the right year, as many of us are only now starting to feel the real pinch of the pandemic on our long term income levels. Could that catch up be spread over 2 yrs?

Why?	I don't like any of these options to be fair! I would like to see the new Theatre as a priority but absolutely not at the expense of Hihiaua or Oruku Landing. I think all these centres tie in together and should move forward in symphony.
	Having been a very long term theatre and arts practitioner in Whangarei (since I was 10 yrs old I've acted, and later produced/directed amateur and professional work here) I believe that a new large "lyric" theatre is an essential part of our growth as a community. an 800 seat theatre as is proposed would not only allow touring shows to come up, but also local troupes/acting/singing/dance/comedy/shakespeare/youth/Ted Talks, the ability to do one night only shows and actually break

even, maybe make a little to seed the next event! I love the Bougainville theatre, I love performing in it, it's intimate and welcoming, but it's nearly impossible to turn a profit, and as at the last moment I tried to book it nearly 10 yrs ago, it's impossible to get a 1 week booking without a small 1 day booking being in the middle of your available timeframes. Does that make sense? So having a second larger theatre also allows all those small community groups that are ESSENTIAL to our young arts practitioners, to have their 1 day bookings for end of term and end of year shows at the Bougainville, while larger groups are not hindered by impractical timeframes in our "only" theatre. Oruku landing will be catering to a different set, as will Hihiaua, and heaven forbid we get all of these centres completed and can host stunning national arts festivals, utilising everything from Hihiaua to Huntderwasser, to the two Forum North theatres and Oruku landing that showcase the breadth of talent and skill hiding in northland!

But wait, I have even another centre on my wishlist! The Old Library. It is and has been a hub now for 18 yrs of arts and is currently brimming with children and music, every day of the week. It's simply magic and in my history with arts I don't think I've seen any facility as well utilsed as this one is. Restoring this building, re-imagining the glass roof so it's visible but able to be blacked out, investing in double-glazing to keep heating bills lower and car noise out, fixing long term leaks, involving the Youth Music Team who include two amazing architects capable of doing this design (Felicity Christian and Roger McClean). It's a Historic Building teeming with the greater Whangarei Community and would be an amazing showpiece set against your new theatres/events centres. I think for a few hundred throusand you would reap a huge benefit, it's already got the

community behind it. But not passing on these costs. What makes this so well used is that it's accessible to everyone, not just the financially able. This would be a real community asset and should be protected as such. Key issue - Climate OPTION 1: Put \$3.7m of new funding towards climate change change and sustainability mitigation and adaptation and waste minimisation. (see page 28) Why? OPTION 2: Spend \$21m to make improvements to James and Key issue - Revitalising our city centre (see page John St as well as either Robert St or Cameron Street. 32) Why? I'm 100% behind this revitalisation, the plans look fantastic. And making more apartment accomodation available in the CBD will be a cornerstone to the sustainability of our city's commerce and night-time safety/vibrancy. Incorporating scooter/bike/skate links in these pedestrian areas is essential, and while the parking options planned on the western side of town look great, I think there needs to be more on the waterfront side as well, it's dire already trying to organise a few friends to meet at the new town basin playground as there is literally no parking available most of the time, what will it be like when hundertwasser is complete, and the ball clock, and all the amazing tourism pulling features down here. Walking 500m simply isn't an option for so many people (my parents and all their friends included!). Will there be a new car park building on this side of town? Or some extra spaces somewhere? Why?	Neither option is good for three reasons:  1) With compounding, the 4.5% is actually really high over 10 years. Showing the calculation for year 1 only does not tell the full story. With compounding, at the end of 10 years, rates will be 50% higher than they are now and in 16 years they will be twice as high. Add to that the increase in property assessments and rates could soon be 3X the current rates. The full cost of the rate increase should be clearly shown to rate payers in order for them to make an informed decision.  2) It needs to be made clear what percentage of rates are going toward debt service versus public services. Borrowing too much could put WDC in a growth, debt and rate increase spiral and leave no capacity for resiliency.  3) Needing to borrow an extra \$100m or a third more than the 2018 long-term plan is not an encouraging sign.

Key issue - Spaces for gathering (see page 24)	
Why?	This response applies only to the conference center and Forum North.

The conference centre is a concept that is pretty much out of date. The world has moved on. Covid may impact gathering in large groups for years to come and collaboration has moved from conference centres to online or gathering in smaller more configurable multi-use live-work venues.

Conference centres create a surge problem in the same way that Queenstown or towns that host cruise ships have a surge problem. They need to build infrastructure to support peak use which is then underutilized most of the time. Every time there is a conference, all the flights, hotels and restaurants are booked out and regular traveller's and locals stay way. Then when there is no conference everything is empty, putting businesses in a cycle of feast or famine.

Just because central government is offering some funding, does not make putting in additional funding a good idea. There are many alternatives to a conference center which would deliver far more value to the district in terms of participating in the new global economy.

Aside from a few avant-garde events or performances, both conference centres and theatres mostly serve the upper echelons of society. This makes them exclusive rather than inclusive. While they provide a few low wages jobs, this impact is small.

Both the conference centre and the theatre are planned to be at or near sea-level and the forecasts are that sea-level will rise and floods will be more frequent and severe.

Both would be first on the list to be closed in the event of a resurgence of Covid or other pandemics or in the event of

flooding, sea-level rise or tsunami. They lower resiliency and sustainability.
In summary: It's hard to imagine how they fit the vision of inclusion, resiliency or sustainability. They are, in many ways, the opposite.

Key issue - Climate change and sustainability (see page 28)	OPTION 2: Put \$7.4m of new funding towards climate change mitigation and adaptation and waste minimisation.
Why?	Mitigating the impacts of climate change should not be a separate budget item in addition to the business as usual plan. Mitigating climate change should be integrated into every capital spend decision. If this was done, none of the projects, like John and James streets, the conference centre or theatre, would pass the test and there would be an extra \$100m of debt capacity for services that are needed or resiliency. Unless absolutely necessary, build anything new at sea level should be discouraged.  Last month there was a siren and we all fled up the hill. What did that tell us about the merits of building at sea-level?

Key issue - Revitalising our city centre (see page 32)	OPTION 3: No additional funding for the city centre.
Why?	City centers can best be made welcoming by enabling the creativity of the businesses and residents without spending a lot of money.  Other global cities have done very simple low cost

improvements like allowing a few parking bays to be converted into mini parklets or extensions to side walk cafe's. This engages local creativity at almost zero cost to the city. https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Parklet

Much of this is simply about permitting and tolerance for creativity rather building things and then constraining use.

Before investing in James and John Street we should do the easy low cost fixes on the things we have like clean up the waterways (the river new WDC 's office for example) and upgrade existing recreational infrastructure like the pool.

Digital signage showing the status of Te Matau A Pohe bridge would allow people to use Riverside Drive more effectively.

This would be a far less expensive first step than building a bridge across the road or changing James and John streets.

# Tell us what you think - any further comments on key issues or other points raised in the Consultation document:

I fully support the vision: inclusive, resilient and sustainable.

Each of the words are powerful in their own right and together they could mean a whole different Whangārei.

Whangarei could be inclusive, resilient and sustainable.

But the projects listed in the plan look mostly business as usual and don't fit the vision. Proposing to build pandemic vulnerable buildings at sea level for use by a limited and mostly privileged segment of the population is not inclusive, resilient or sustainable.

To achieve the vision there are three elements that need to be addressed.

1) Being fully transparent on the costs to the rate payers

- 2) Understand the demographic of people who would enable the vision and how to attract and retain them.
- 3) Funds should be allocated in the following order.
- 1) The basic infrastructure needed
- 2) Cleaning up and fixing what we already have (rivers)
- 3) Amenities that serve all including the demographic of people who would enable the vision
- 4) Build a reserve fund or capacity for resilience
- 5) Nice to have projects
- 6) Rethink constructing buildings that are in a projected flood or sea-level rise inundation zone

As other world cities have shown, Whangārei could benefit from greater connection to the global economy and that by its nature would include attracting and retaining a greater diversity of ethnicity, national origin, gender and world view. This would improve creativity and innovation which in turn would increase the tax base which would reduce the need for further increases in rates.

One example is that many companies outside of New Zealand now allow people to work from anywhere. That means that Whangārei's youth (and not so youth) could work for almost any company and continue to live and play in Whangārei. They could earn a global equivalent salary, support local businesses and contribute to the local tax base. Digital nomads and tech migrants could work from Whangārei. Whangārei could be a burgeoning hub of the distributed economy where people work at strange hours for far away companies that most of us have never heard of living in live-work spaces that most of us have never experienced and enjoying recreational lifestyles that most of us never thought possible. To be inclusive, resilient and sustainable, this is the demographic that Whangārei needs to attract and retain.

They won't want conference centres or theatres. They want to be able to commute by skateboard, scooter or bike, swim in a really nice pool and clean ocean, they want to walk beside clean rivers, go to a rock-climbing gym, practice yoga and meditation, enjoy nightlife, hike and bike on trails, eat really good organic spray-free food, and they want a relevant

educational facility with as much of it as possible powered by clean, local energy.

These are all things that Whangārei could deliver in partnership with commercial interests, but WDC would need to make these easier than they currently are. They would all be a lot cheaper than building a theatre or conference centre and the payback would be a lot faster.

Finally, there are some readily addressable challenges that would cost very little to solve:

#### Resiliency:

Much of the resiliency capability such as shelter, medical, power, food production and civil defense services are in tsunami or flood inundation zones. Any new capacity should be built 20 to 50 meters above sea level.

#### Sustainability:

Glyphosate, a chemical banned for its proven toxicity in several countries and US states, is still widely applied and advocated for by the WDC. A moratorium on its use by council until proven safe or severely restricting its use would reduce health costs, improve the environment and possibly provide more employment.

#### Inclusion:

A few simply things could be done to help with inclusion such as program to educate everyone with a customer facing business in the district on how to interact with people of varied backgrounds could produce a step function change in how all people feel about Whangārei. It would also mean more revenue for those businesses so there would be short payback.

#### 1 - WDC ENHANCING LOCAL DEMOCRACY

- Automated replies for all email accounts of WDC employees. To improve communications between the public and WDC, and the quality of your services, it should be compulsory for *all* council employees to have an automated reply for their email accounts, acknowledging reception and giving a time frame on when to expect an answer. This is so we the public are assured that the government we are paying and have entrusted to run our affairs are actually listening. A feedback and update on the following actions would also be needed.
- -Important public consultations like the annual plans and 10 year plan should be notified via the same channels as the public receives their rates invoices. This is to assure that all citizens are given the opportunity to participate in decision making of our future. Newspapers are very rarely read these days and many people are not on Face Book or other social media, but everybody gets their rates bills. A longer run-up time should also be implemented.
- -Most people are not aware of the most basic WDC regulations and their rights, in regards to noise and air pollution (like the no-spray register). An annual brochure mail-out together with the rates, could help raise awareness on how the community can work together for a healthy environment.
- **-Councils should pilot a range of democratic innovations** e.g. input from Citizen's Assemblies, citizen working groups/panels, participatory budgeting.
- -Councillors and councils need to provide more opportunities for citizens to interact and engage with them. Constituents can provide valuable input and need to be engaged between elections, not just during them.

ACTION STATION And Action and the public can better create positive outcomes for our future. See attached document.

#### 2 TOWN & URBAN PLANNING

- Tree protection for all native vegetation and mature exotic trees

In spite of WDC declaring Climate Emergency last year, there is no sign that WDC understands the implications of tree removal. The latest tragic example of WDCs misguided decisions on enhancing public spaces, is the removal of the Pohutakawas in the Town Basin. I'm sure Hundertwasser is spinning in his grave! He designed his creations to incorporate trees....he didn't have them cut down!

Other examples of tragic vegetation losses are the mangroves in the Town Basin (against dire warnings about the environmental impact from experts) and the Pohutakawa by the new civic centre.

Stop cutting down our trees! We need trees to shade the asphalt and concrete jungle you have created. Town planning should make it *compulsory* to have *every parking lot shaded by trees,* as well as at least 30 percent of the roads, to mitigate man-made climate warming.

SOLUTION: PROTECT ALL NATIVE AND MATURE EXOTIC TREES AND PLANT MORE TREES.

# Other issues: WDC is not adhering to their own 'Environmental Engineering Standards', and is not seeking expert advice, otherwise we wouldn't see such disasters as:

- the toxic paint of the Loop's board walk section flaking into the water;
- the coating of the 'improved' Town Basin playground getting washed into the drains by storm water;
- -the 'improved' playground turned into a concrete heat sink. Apart from the sun sails, there is no shade provided by trees. To create such an artificial setting in a time when people start to realise how disconnected children have become from Nature, is not progressive.

The children visiting the playground are exposed to the dangers of:

- falling into the river;
- to dog attacks which have become frequent in the district and small children are at high risk when running in proximity of dogs that are not on a leash. WDC is not policing its 'dog on leash' policy. Dog control should permanently monitor this area and impose an immediate infringement penalty on all offenders;
- -the playground and Loop are contaminated by dog faeces; this is a health hazard especially in such areas were people and their children sit and play on the ground. Instant infringement penalties for not picking up after your dog should be implemented;
- -getting run over by cars, because WDC refuses to fence the playground. At the very least, there should be signage all araound the parking lot adjacent to the playground, advising people to check under their cars and back out extra carefully, as a small child may have escaped their parents unnoticed; SOLUTION: FENCE THE PLAYGROUND

-WDC upgraded the unformed stretch of Te Toiroa road to a shared cycleway *inclusive of cars*, without an environmental risk assessment, nor an environmental engineering design, as per requirements by the WDC 'Environmental Engineering Standards'. This is not only a serious safety risk for all users, but endangers the stability of the whole escarpment; the water catchment below, as well as the adjacent bush reserve and kiwi habitat. This leaves WDC liable to legal action.

# SOLUTION: WDC ADHERE TO YOUR 'ENVIRONMENTAL ENGINEERING STANDARDS' AND SEEK INDEPENDENT EXPERT ADVICE FOR *ALL* PUBLIC PROJECTS.

The health of the environment and human health are interconnected. The current COVID-19 pandemic is yet another warning of the consequences of ignoring these connections. If we are to constrain the emergence of new infections and future pandemics, we must cease our exploitation, degradation and pollution of the natural world. For infectious diseases such as COVID-19, air pollution creates another risk. COVID-19 causes a respiratory illness and, <u>as with SARS</u>, exposure to air pollution worsens our vulnerability. Particles of air pollution also <u>act as transport for pathogens</u>, contributing to the spread of viruses and infectious disease across large distances.

# 3 – IMPLEMENT AN IMMEDIATE MORATORIUM ON ALL AERIAL AND ROADSIDE SPRAYING WITH TOXIC CHEMICAL PESTICIDES.

Since the 1920s there has been strong scientific evidence about the adverse effects of toxic pesticides on the environment and all life forms, yet NZ is still using highly hazardous pesticides that have been banned in other countries.

It is a well-documented fact that pesticides adversely affect the respiratory systems (among a long list of other symptoms) and that pesticides weaken the immune system of *all* life forms.

Given that Japan has recently rejected NZ honey on the basis of containing only *traces* of glyphosate, I believe it is only reasonable to ask our government: "What do the Japanese know that we don't?"

NZ is relying on 'safety data' provided by the very industry that is making billions of dollars on selling their products. If NZ doesn't have the funding for independent research, we should be looking for advice from better informed sources, like the United Nations.

Blanket spraying of 'undesirable' plants, as in aerial and roadside spraying, is proven to be not only dangerous and unproductive, but also financially inefficient, wasting our tax dollar. Indiscriminate pesticide spraying is creating very costly problems, such as erosion, pollution of the waterways and serious health issues for humans, live-stock and wildlife. Pesticide poisoning is linked to cancer, endocrine disruption, reproductive effects, neurotoxicity, kidney and liver damage, birth defects, and developmental changes in a wide range of species.

The continued and indiscriminate use of toxic pesticides is a breach of one of our most basic human rights – the right to health!

On this basis, I believe it is our right that we ask all our government agencies to exercise the precautionary principle and place an immediate moratorium on Glyphosate and all other HHPs!

SOLUTION: THERE ARE MANY NON-TOXIC METHODS FOR ROADSIDE MAINTENANCE, WHICH ARE REGENERATIVE, SUSTAINABLE AND COULD BRING MANY PERMANENT JOBS INTO OUR COMMUNITIES, IF THE ROADSIDE MAINTENANCE CONTRACTS WERE ASSIGNED TO EACH INDIVIDUAL COMMUNITY.

### **Objectives:**

**Minimizing** the pollution of our waterways and environment by highly hazardous pesticides/herbicides, by practicing *integrated* roadside maintenance.

**Replacing** non-targeted herbicide sprays and destructive slashing with the MOLD method (method-of-least-disturbance).

**Restoring** our ecosystems by replacing weeds along roadsides with native vegetation (or beneficial non-native plants), to stabilize the soil, prevent erosion, enhance and promote biodiversity and provide habitat/shelter/food for wildlife.

**Promoting** the long-term financial **benefit** for ratepayers by **reducing** the costs of roadside maintenance.

Providing people in *our* community with a *permanent* income, by gaining the contract for roadside maintenance as a 'community business'.

Job offers include: landscapers, arborists, ecologists, equipment service team; botanists, nursery managers, administration staff and educational program managers (to share the learning process and knowledge with the next generation).

Please note: road safety is *not* promoted by eliminating all vegetation to give a better view. This will only entice people to take more risks. The roads are just as windy without vegetation. Natural vegetation reducing visibility will slow people down, naturally.

### 4 - GE/GMOS ISSUE

I support the councils precautionary and prohibitive GE/GMO provisions/ policies/ rules in the operative WDC District Plan and previous Long Term Plan, which addresses: the risks of any outdoor GE/GMOs experiments/ field trials/ releases to our biosecurity, unique biodiversity, wider environment, existing GM/GMO free primary producers, food sovereignty, economy, Hua Parakore, cultural values, and the public health.

Please retain and enhance the precautionary and prohibitive GE/GMO policy in the Long Term Plan. I urge you to specifically mention that GMOs (genetically modified organisms) now includes risky gene edited organisms/ CRISPR). Gene edited organisms have been shown to have unexpected/unforseen off target adverse effects and should not be allowed in NZ.

I also oppose any outdoor use of risky and controversial "gene drive" (a sterility technique that has grave risks).

PROPOSAL 5 - PINE FOREST PLANTATIONS TO BE CLASSED AS A 'NOT PERMITTED ACTIVITY' OF LAND USE WITHIN A RADIUS OF A MINIMUM OF 40KM FROM THE COASTS AND ANY RESIDENTIAL DEVELOPMENTS.

Current permits and leases in these areas should not be renewed. Ideally, the ill-conceived plan to mitigate climate change by planting pine trees should be immediately revised. Consideration should be given to transition the existing pine forests into native tree forestry, using the pines as shade and shelter, instead of felling them. This has been successfully trialled.

The adverse effects of pine plantations on the environment and human health are numerous and well documented. The severe noise and air pollution and traffic congestions associated with logging, which often last for several months, severely compromise the well-being of the residential communities (human and wildlife). Not only do pine trees cause soil acidification and decrease the water flow in streams; the practice of clear felling at logging harvest stage, often on steep slopes, exposes soil to rains and erosion, with resultant heavy silting of streams which in turn smothers important native invertebrate larvae, resulting in the destruction of the freshwater and ocean aquatic ecosystems.

#### PINE TREES ARE ALSO ONE OF THE BIGGEST CONTRIBUTORS TO AIR POLLUTION.

They give off gases that react with airborne chemicals, many of which are produced by human activity, creating tiny, invisible particles that muddy the air. The small particles influence cloud formation and rainfall, and affect climate and human health. *In the United States each year, 50,000 premature deaths from heart and lung disease are attributable to excess concentrations of aerosols*. What complicates matters is that the atmosphere is a highly oxidizing, highly reactive place, which means that aerosols are transformed very rapidly into particles that can have completely different chemical compositions.

### Excerpts from Section 9 - Rules for Industrial or Trade Premises Regional Air Quality Plan 55

- 9. RULES FOR DISCHARGES OF CONTAMINANTS TO AIR FROM INDUSTRIAL OR TRADE PREMISES
- 9.1- 1(b) The discharge shall not result in offensive or objectionable odour, or any *noxious or dangerous level of gases*, beyond the boundary of the subject property.
- 4 (a) The discharge shall not result in any offensive or objectionable dust deposition, or any noxious or dangerous levels of airborne particulate matter, beyond the boundary of the subject property.

It is also a well-known fact that pine pollen is a significant allergen, causing allergic conjunctivitis, rhinitis and asthma in a great number of people every season. Again, this is a factor making us more susceptible to Covid and other viruses that may come.

- -businesses working towards food security within their community, such as organic growers;
- -lease publicly owned land only to regenerative land use practioners;

people (locals and visitors) on an emotional level to think about the impact we humans have on the environment.... in a fun, creative and interactive way!

#### Outcome:

- -Offering activities on our coast, which raise awareness through art projects and inspire people to reconnect with Nature through their creativity and emotions.
- -Creating an income for a wider group of locals.
- -Enhancing the cultural image of our community.
- -Enhancing the Tutukaka coast events calendar.
- -Promoting and educating people about sustainability;

### Making it happen:

The creation of the sculptures could be a programme to create income for the wider local community, such as hosting art workshops in our community (for example in Maraes) as 'holiday packages' with accommodation, food and guided tours included.

Creating the sculptures is only *one* aspect of the art-making events. It can encompass festivals, competitions, story-telling (cultural history), movie screening (environmental themes), costume balls, performances etc.

The Hatea Loop is fabulous, thank you but again too many areas of hard surfaces, which are often white stark concrete hard on the eyes and not uptodate with mitigating climate change. I appreciate the versatility of footpaths for 'Shared Paths' but they are also harsh on hips and knees. More trees are needed to give sunshade and absorb water run off. Whangarei's many waterways could be an attractive feature for walking and cycleways and

this would give an opportunity to clean up the waterways. I envisage linking the beautiful little 'Pocket Park' with shared path through the centre via Reyburn St, to Caffler Park and joining the Kamo Cycleway. This would instantly revitalise the City Centre.

Roadside spraying and clearing needs to be more selective so native trees are preserved and exotic pampas weeds etc removed. This would indeed take longer in the short term but would give longer term results mitigating climate change and a more attractive region.

The Tutukaka Cycleway should not be a roadway for cars, it is unsafe for both walkers and cyclists, speed limits are ridiculous and in particular large vehicles such as motorhomes, tradesman trucks etc, motorbikes shouldn't be allowed. It is a disgrace as a 'cycleway' and right next to vulnerable beautiful covenanted native bush with kiwis.

- 1) TRAFFIC CALMING. Additional Traffic calming measures to King Street and Mains Ave. These streets are now the ONLY TWO feeder streets leading to Otangarei that do not have speed humps to slow speeding traffic. SOLUTION Build speed humps similar in design to those recently added between the existing ones in Jack street. BACKGROUND The Keyte Street works completed approx 2 .5 years ago has resulted in a re-direction of traffic from that street into King Street and Mains Ave. Something similar occurred a number of years ago when chicanes were built in Mains Ave, followed by lane restrictions in Keyte Street. This lead to the channelling of significantly more traffic flowing through King Street, much of it traveling so fast that it was impossible to sight the number plates. WDC accepted then that traffic re-direction was happening in King Street and with sustained neighbour input, chicanes (similar to Mains Ave) were built. My recent emails to - and replies from - Cr Connop and the traffic engineers shows that there is no acceptance by Council this time that something similar is occurring as a consequence of the Keyte Street speed humps. This is disappointing. While speeds are not as high post chicane installation, they are still much greater than the recommended 25 kph with vehicles slowing down, racing between chicanes, sometimes skidding as they go. Some negotiate the chicanes on the opposite side of the street, maintaining a higher speed due the straighter line offered by this route.
- 2) CATS. We are keen to see WDC following Wellington and Palmerston North who allocate \$20,000 to \$25,000 annually to for cat snip n chip campaigns to reduce the number if feral cats. We suggest that the WDC help solve the problem of 'lost' and abandoned cats and kittens that are suffering from starvation and cruelty; damaging our environment; and creating problems for residents and businesses in our community as follows:
- 1. Introduce new bylaws mandating that all companion cats are de-sexed, micro-chipped and registered (on NZCAR the NZ Companion Animal Register) by 6 months of age a once in the cat's lifetime cost.
- 2. Provide and financially contribute to subsidised de-sexing, micro-chipping and registering programmes throughout year for people on low incomes. Some councils in NZ already provide this service by working with their local vet clinics and/or SPCA.

Over time, both these measures would help reduce the number of lost and abandoned cats and kittens in the community. Mandatory de-sexing would also reduce the number of unwanted cats and kittens taken to cat shelters. Mandatory micro-chipping and registering would enable many lost cats and kittens to be reunited with their owners.

The council needs to reassess the rules with regards to Rural Production and sub division. Historically farmers could sub divide 4ha quite easily as a retirement fund or when times were tough and they needed to take some cash out of the farm. In most cases it was often the least productive corner and wouldn't effect production or the overall value of the farm. Now the area is 20ha as a controlled activity. The intent is to reduce the effect on productive land. In reality it just creating larger lifestyle blocks which in effect reduces the level of production anyway. So isn't actually achieving the required outcome. However farmers will still look to sub divide land.

A better solution could see a pragmatic approach to sub division. Most people looking for land in the country don't want 20ha. Leave to a needs assessment of each area. If a land owner has 100ha - using the controlled activity rule then they are in principle allowed 5 titles. A better solution would be for an assessment of logical natural boundaries and the nature of the surroundings. Sometimes this would mean 4 x 1ha with a residual of 96ha - which is a better way to protect the production.

There is a push for a move to the country - more people in the country builds communities, increases rates and helps develop further infrastructure.

Re page 39, 'Riverside/Onerahi Road', I consider a bypass most desirable to take the increasing 'through' traffic from the Whangarei Heads to the city and beyond. At present Riverside Drive is a bottleneck so a safe and accessible alternative route is not only for convenience but also for safety in case of a disaster, such as a large tsunami.

The Kamo bypass has shown that the township actually benefits from this model: people used to avoid it because of the congestion and it is now a flourishing area with a stronger identity. I would expect the same result for Onerahi if a bypass is constructed.

Overall, I would like to say that I think the council does a great job, and the continuing improvements and attention to beauty, as well as function, provide a city both increasingly user-friendly and attractive.

# On Its 2021 – 2031 Long Term Plan

## March 2021

By Chris Leitch: Leader; Finance Spokesperson

A rates rise of 6.5%, including a catch up for rates deferred last year, might be considered justifiable in a situation where none of the city's ratepayers had lost their jobs or had a significantly reduced level of income as a result of the virus. While the income of councillors and council staff may not have been affected, that is not the case for a significant number of Whangarei's ratepayers or businesses.

People's incomes are more under stress now than they have been in the last 40 years or more, yet council appears to be proceeding on the basis of everything being 'hunky dory' with big spending plans on 'show off' projects with rates rises and borrowing increases to match.

The plan shows the council intends to double the amount of its net debt (borrowing) over the 10 years of the plan to \$360 million and raise rates by 6.5% in the first year with cumulative rates increases of 4.5% in subsequent years.

If it was the average household doing a budget for the next few years it would right now be cutting back on anything that was not absolutely essential.

The extent to which the basics are not being attended to shows with the Government's plan, already underway, to take fresh water and waste water assets, paid for by ratepayers over decades, off councils and transfer them into just four or five enormous regional bodies. The council's water rates increases are intended to boost investment in those assets, but again the increases will hit ratepayers hard, and will not stop the transfer of those assets out of council hands.

In more buoyant economic times as a plan for the future what is proposed might be considered acceptable, but right now it's like the itinerary for a world trip that you can't afford, but you're going to do anyway and put it on the credit card and hope you'll be able to pay it off.

In Council's case, that will incur significant fees and interest charges while you do - \$7.30 million in the 2020/21 year rising to \$13 million in 2031.

The total interest over the 10 years of the plan amounts to \$108.5 million.

That's \$108.5 million of ratepayers money that will be wasted because it will not provide one additional service for the people who paid it. What it will provide is a \$108.5 million transfer of hard earned income out of the pockets of ratepayers and businesses who can ill afford it, directly into the pockets of wealthy money lenders – mostly commercial banks and institutional investors.

The thing that stands out is that despite having an alternative funding option put in front of this council at numerous consultations since 2012, little in the way of serious investigation of that possible option has been undertaken.

Not one councillor has ever approached me to ask for clarification or further understanding of that option. Not one council workshop has been held to debate the possibilities. Not one other council has been contacted to see if they thought there was any merit in the proposal.

While innovative and imaginative thinking has gone into the presentation of the plan booklet, and the new Town Basin park project, innovative and imaginative thinking is sadly missing when it comes to looking at how to fund council's proposals and the same old "we'll just put the rates up" answer has resulted, as if ratepayers have some magic money tree at the bottom of their garden they can find the additional rates from.

We all know that the greatest single factor that could deliver the vision in the plan, and more besides, is money - lots of it - and right now, New Zealand has a source, unexplored in potential funding considerations, which has lots of it, and is dishing it out to banks and speculators to drive up the escalator ride in house prices.

\$128 billion by 2022 is the sum of money the Reserve Bank is creating (out of thin air) and pumping into the speculative sector of the economy.

When we suggested that funding source to this council in submissions in 2012, 2014, 2015, 2016, 2017 and 2018, despite being supported by solid evidence, most councillors and officers would have written it off as pie in the sky, 'funny money' nonsense, and not given it another thought. But just twelve months ago the Reserve Bank started to do exactly what we had said it could, and create a big big bundle of new money – that \$128 billion.

Northland's councils, perhaps in conjunction with other councils, should be petitioning the government for either a share of that new money, or a fund similarly sourced, to enable the projects identified in the plan to be rolled out, without the need to put ratepayers under further financial stress. After all, the plans for Whangarei only need a tiny fraction of that \$128 billion.

The Reserve Bank has the ability to fund local body capital projects.

The Public Finance Act (1989) permits the borrowing of funds from the Reserve Bank of NZ on terms favourable to the public interest.

So despite what most of you have believed for most of your life, such funding is possible, at no interest, and for many projects, without repayment being necessary, saving ratepayers immense sums of money that currently go to pay interest on conventional borrowing.

Our submission to the Productivity Commission's 'Local Government Funding & Financing' enquiry is attached which provides more detail on the proposal.

This council should carry out a thorough investigation of the concept, then commit to it, get other councils across the country to do the same, and get on with lobbying government hard through the Local Government Association to provide Reserve Bank funding for the development and infrastructure funding councils deserve.

I wonder if this submission will generate any interest in the concepts we are proposing, and any further discussion or enquiry.

You hold in your hands the key to providing Whangarei with a safer, more appealing city, much better infrastructure, better community facilities and a level of rates that people and business can afford. This will make Whangarei more attractive for new businesses to invest and existing businesses to move into our region providing significant numbers of jobs for Northlanders and a major boost in economic activity and additionally provide an environment where people can truly say 'Love it here'.

What's to lose?

# **Local Government Funding & Financing Issues**

Thank you for the opportunity to present our views for consideration.

## <u>Submission</u>

Over the last 30 years local councils have seen significantly increased demands being placed on their funding, organisational, and service delivery capabilities.

Some of those increased demands are:-

Responsibilities transferred from Central Government

Higher environmental standards, health and safety requirements, and other regulatory standards

Aging infrastructure both above ground and below ground

Earthquake strengthening requirements

Pressure on services from increased tourism

Population growth from high immigration

Higher standards for fresh water and wastewater services as well as additional supply requirements

Additional demands on roading with significantly more trucks replacing former rail transport.

Councils have been able to increase rates and charges to endeavour to fund some of those requirements, but the ability to continue to do so is being constrained due to the country's aging population, with more ratepayers on fixed incomes, and due to the fact that New Zealand is operating a low wage economy, meaning the majority of wage earners are already living with household budgets under stress.

Most councils see little in the way of alternative however, and things like petrol taxes and a range of other taxes and user charges are being investigated. Indeed the report by Local Government New Zealand came up with little in the way of other ideas. It appears that extracting more money out of ratepayer's pockets or increased borrowing are the only alternatives that are being explored.

Many councils have joined the Local Government Funding Agency in an effort to obtain better borrowing rates. Regardless of the rate, this still requires ratepayers to either come up with more money or except reduced services as more and more of council income is siphoned off to pay interest on private sector borrowing or profits to investors in the Local Government Funding Agency.

Indeed the website of the local government funding agency says the LGFA in 2011 won an award for their contribution to the development of Capital Markets in New Zealand. 'We provide investors with a new source of securities rated at AA+ by international credit ratings agencies'.

Ratepayers expect the money they pay to go towards providing services in their area, not to be the source of a significant contribution to the development of Capital Markets for wealthy investors.

Public/Private partnership schemes likewise have a similar result with ratepayers funding 25year gold plated profit streams for private investors.

Already over \$800 million dollars of taxpayers money is spent every year on paying interest on council borrowing, when it could (and should) be providing services and facilities for local communities.

There is however another funding option that has not been investigated by local government New Zealand or by individual councils.

In 2012 the International Monetary Fund published a lengthy report entitled the Chicago Plan Revisited.

Its authors, two senior researchers, one of whom is now a senior researcher at the Bank of England, investigated, analysed, and modelled a plan of a similar name proposed in the 1930's by leading economists including Irving Fisher and Henry Simons.

Their conclusion was that governments should issue credit through their Central Banks for use to, for example, provide the country with funds for building assets.

They identified a number of very significant advantages over the present system in using that mechanism. One in particular was there would not be Inflation generated as a result. A second and highly desirable one was that the government would not be using precious tax revenues to fund the interest payments on money accessed from the private sector.

That tax revenue, currently approximately \$5 billion dollars each year, would become available to provide services such as health, education, etc for New Zealanders.

Japan is currently using that mechanism as is China.

The process has been used in the past.

In Australia the Commonwealth Bank funded Central Government expenditure, and a similar situation existed in Canada. In New Zealand, the Reserve Bank funded the building of approximately 30,000 state houses between 1936 and 1949, and provided the producer boards with overdraft facilities at 1% interest.

Despite it's resounding success that source of funding ceased to be used soon afterwards.

An attempt was made in 1978 by then MP Bruce Beetham to introduce the mechanism in New Zealand once more with the tabling of the Credit and Currency Bill, and Reserve Bank Amendment Bill in parliament. Regrettably the bills did not get the support of the house and as a consequence thousands of billions of taxpayer dollars have been spent in paying the interest on government borrowing - from mainly overseas owned financial institutions - since then, rather than being used to provide services for New Zealanders.

The mechanism is one that, in recent years, is attracting significant international support from economists and financial writers including Lord Adair Turner, former chairman of Britain's Financial Services Authority, Professor Richard Werner from Southampton University, Ann Pettifor, director of Policy Research in Macroeconomics, Professor Steve Keen, head of the School of Economics at Kingston University in London, Martin Wolf, chief economics editor at the Times of London, Anatole Kaletsky, editor at the Financial Times, and numerous others. In New Zealand, Bernard Hickey and Bryan Gould are among those promoting the idea.

New Zealand is in a unique position being one of only a handful of countries that has a publicly owned central bank. Any charges the bank may make on implementing the concept would flow through into profits returnable to the government.

The implementation of the mechanism would remove very considerable stress on government finances in that the \$5 billion dollar saving in interest annually would significantly boost funding for difficult areas such as in health, education, and state sector salaries while the creation of Reserve Bank credit would provide funds necessary for things like investment in transport projects, water supply, wastewater treatment, forestry, in the regions and in environmental protection, to name just a few.

These investments could be made by granting no interest loans to local councils, and/or suspensory loans which would not require repayment. Water supply, wastewater treatment, roads, and earthquake strengthening would be suitable candidates for this type of funding.

As the Chicago Plan Revisited states, if private banks can, as they do, create credit in the process of granting loans to customers, a fact backed up by the Bank of England, the NZ Reserve Bank, and the German Bundesbank, (as well as many other sources) there is nothing stopping the central bank from using the same mechanism to create credit for government investment in the country.

Government or local body stock available to private sector institutions would of course be reduced, however this type of passive investment could beneficially be used instead for active investment in the productive sector of the economy, providing not only a rate of return that is better than that obtained on government sector stock, but also significantly improving the country's production, GDP, and living standards.

On all counts there would appear to be only wins for a government that had recommendations with so many benefits, in a report from an institution such as the Productivity Commission, that it could use as a basis for proposing such measures be adopted.

We urge you to investigate the possibilities, our references, and include those recommendations in your report.

We are available for further consultation and would be keen to participate further.

# Section of Beach Road, Onerahi, is dangerous for pedestrians

The WDC has created a well-used, safe, shared path from Beach Road, along the Waimahanga Track and Riverside Drive, to the Town Basin. Many more people are using Beach Road because there is now a safe pathway. It is great to see people of all ages enjoying the area every day-walking, running, cycling and taking their dogs for a walk, families with babies in prams and young children riding their bikes. Many people like to complete a circuit of Beach Rd and have to use a dangerous, narrow road with no footpath to do this.

<u>Frequently reckless drivers choose to use Beach Road to drive as fast as they can,</u> sometimes with groups of cars. It is frightening when cars speed past and are dangerously close to you. These drivers have a complete disregard for the safety of people and their families who enjoy walking along this scenic part of our harbour.

Many species of birds live in this area. I regularly walk around Beach Road and I frequently witness cruel drivers deliberately mowing down flocks of birds, killing and maiming them. Many people do not realise that some species like the Red-billed Gull is native to NZ and their numbers are in decline. Caring people do not like to witness this deliberate cruelty. This creates additional work for the Native Bird Recovery Centre volunteers. Traffic calming measures would slow drivers down and make Beach Road safer for all bird life too.

The WDC has encouraged people to use this beautiful area and now needs to complete the circuit of Beach Road and make it safer for people and birdlife.

Suggestions - make Beach Road:

- a one way street from the Onerahi Yacht Club to Hill St
- · continue the concreted shared path to Hill St
- put in traffic calming measures from the Raurimu Road intersection to Hill St

# **Executive summary**

Wellbeing is more important than ever with the COVID-19 pandemic and the highly uncertain economic outlook both having an impact all aspects of our lives. We know if we can raise the physical activity levels of New Zealanders it will lead to better health and social outcomes.

Whangarei, like many Districts of New Zealand, faces challenges in relation to the provision of play, active recreation and sport opportunities. The District's population is growing and will likely exceed 100,000 residents over the period of the LTP (10 years). The population growth while positive, brings with it the challenge of providing for increased sport and recreation demand and increasing participant expectations. The resident population is also aging with the highest growth age-group regionally being those aged over 65 years. Consideration to the needs of those at this life-stage will continue to be a challenge for the District over the next ten years and beyond.

The Whangarei Active Recreation and Sport Strategy provides a high-level view of the district needs in the short, medium and long-term. Sport NZ commends the Whangarei District for adopting the strategy in March 2019 and responding to the challenge of acting on those projects identified as being of priority for the District. Sport NZ also support WDC funding for the implementation of the Whangarei Active Recreation and Sport Strategy – specifically a District Facility Navigator role to support the development of the prioritised hub initiatives and sport specific facility plans – as well as support funding for major recommendations in the strategy such as the development of an aquatic facility plan, a courts plan, a sports field demand study and land acquisition for future provision and a marine hub master plan.

Play is a vital component of our strategy at Sport NZ with research showing that play has many benefits for children, families, and the wider community. Through our regional partner Sport Northland, we would like to work with Council (and different departments within Council like roading, landscaping, libraries etc) to create more playful spaces (so beyond playground development). With our support, the team at Sport Northland would like to pilot ideas based on community willingness around play streets, play on your way, utilising parks and reserves in different ways (e.g. loose parts play, sensory play etc) and to leverage off the work and recommendations identified in Kōkiri Ai Te Waka Hourua (Te Tai Tokerau moving forward in partnership – a strategy for play, active recreation and sport 2021-2030).

## Our feedback on your Long term Plan

In response to the 2021-31 LTP consultation document, we wish to comment on the following:

- 1. Thank you: On behalf of the people of the Whangarei and Sport NZ, thank you for your contribution to play, active recreation and sport in your district. As highlighted in our executive summary, district councils are key enablers in driving the desired wellbeing outcomes we seek for all New Zealanders, so your effort and investment is sincerely appreciated. Sport NZ would also like to take this opportunity to thank Council for the part that it plays in the strong partnership that exists between Sport Northland and Whangarei District Council, as evidenced by the extensive list of projects, programmes and quality opportunities that have been developed over recent years.
- 2. Support a specific WDC funding contribution towards the construction of the **Ruakaka wahi takaro Northland Volleyball Arena project.**

- 3. **Support for specific projects** highlighted in the consultation document: the continuation of Pohe island developments; Hikurangi Skatepark; upgrade of walking tracks; developing community sportsfields/hubs.
- 4. That Council considers increasing the amount of funding available for active recreation and sport facilities through the **contestable partnership fund** we believe an increase of funding should be available for key sport and recreation facilities.
- 5. That Council considers applying a **consistent model for the operational/maintenance costs** of key facilities across the district e.g. replacement turf for the Northland All-Weather Track is consistent with what occurs for Northland Hockey turf.

Sport NZ would also like to comment on the following statements that are included in the LTP supporting documentation:

## Use of technology

PARKS AND RECREATION: The way we use our public spaces is changing. The Active Recreation Strategy and Open Space Strategy highlights what sports are growing and where current allocation doesn't meet demand. As we grow, we will likely experience decentralisation of parks and recreational infrastructure, or their placement in outlying rather than central parts of our District. This will require new land acquisition, but also reviewing how we use the land that we already own and how we provide for the increasing emergence of non-organised recreation. As the climate changes new turf management practices and technologies will need to be reviewed to enable us to maintain our parks to with reduced water and with hotter temperatures. A further trend is toward recognising streets as public space assets and designing them so that they are better used by our communities.

Agree with this statement – it is great to see Council thinking about the future use of public spaces and in catering for active recreation as well as organised sport.

#### Walking and cycling shared path connections

MOST LIKELY MANAGEMENT SCENARIO: The constrained road network in Whangārei City and high dependence on private vehicle use results in higher traffic volumes on its arterial road network and is resulting in congestion in the commuter peaks. The high traffic growth rate in Whangārei is expected to continue for the near future due to high population, freight and tourism growth. To address this issue Council will:

- address capacity issues at known problem areas
- support the Northland Regional Council bus initiatives to encourage higher passenger numbers and would reduce private vehicle use and congestion rural bus services would reduce rural commuter traffic on key arterials servicing the city
- provide cycleway connections in Whangārei
- improve walking and cycling connections in rural towns.

It is exciting to see the ongoing development of cycleway and shared path connections, not only in the builtup urban areas, but also in the district's rural towns. As the district's population grows, house and rental prices may push more residents to live in rural areas and therefore the need for them to be active and connected will increase.

#### Major sportshub purchase and development

MOST LIKELY SCENARIO – NEW URBAN SITE: Council's Active Recreation and Sport Strategy identified the need for an additional sports hub to address the growing need for active recreation within Whangārei. The purchase of a significant area of land will be required to provide this. An urban site has been identified as the most likely and best option. The estimated \$15m does not include development. Timing: 2028-29 Estimated uninflated cost: \$15m Note: Detailed option analysis and costings will be done through the project planning stages

#### Growth of parks requires increased land provision across Parks and Recreation categories

MOST LIKELY MANAGEMENT SCENARIO: Increased numbers of residents, particularly in areas that may experience higher than expected growth, place additional pressure on existing recreational facilities. As growth occurs, the availability of suitable land also becomes an issue, making it more difficult and expensive to provide appropriate

facilities. Council cannot rely on planning techniques to ensure that open space is provided within new developments as this is not currently a requirement within the District Plan. Without projects identified in the LTP such as neighbourhood reserve purchases, Council cannot collect development contributions to purchase land or enter in Private Developer Agreements to offset DCs against land to vest as part of new subdivisions. The Active Recreation and Sport Strategy has identified a need for a significant land purchase to respond to growth with a facility similar to Kensington Park. Council will address this issue by:

- reviewing current Parks and Recreation sites to determine their area of benefit and capacity
- · considering more strategic land purchases and provide funding for a major strategic land purchase
- requesting the addition of Neighbourhood Park land purchases in the next LTP.

With the district's predicted demographics showing continued large growth in population, we believe a significant land purchase to provide for a similar site as Kensington Park is a must-do for Council; we would even suggest that Council looks at progressing this earlier than 2028.

We are making this submission as individuals and do not wish to be heard.

#### Submission Points:

We have considered the submission form provided in the proposed LTP. That form focusses on the specific proposals made within the LTP document. However, our first point is that fundamentally the LTP does not provide for residents of the Maungakahia/Maungatapere ward. We are a growing area, and need to be reflected in this document. I consider that the document is heavily focussed on central city projects.

That notwithstanding, the following submission points are consistent with proposed Community Outcome "Efficient and resilient core services", in particular, "there are opportunities to walk and cycle", and "the District is well prepared for growth and can adapt to change". The submission points are consistent with Community Outcomes "Caring for the Environment", and "Proud to be local". They are also consistent with page 11, paragraph one which states that community spaces are part of getting the basics right.

I wish for the Council to consider including the following in the LTP and subsequent implementation plans:

- I would like the WDC to provide funding and support/expertise to help establish a walking path in Maungatapere. There are limited opportunities for people to walk or cycle for recreation. The main roads are both state highways with heavy levels of traffic and not suitable for use by recreational walkers. Residents are therefore met with the option of recreating in the area and taking on substantial safety risks, not recreating, or driving elsewhere. Our nearest park is Barge Park which requires people to drive. This is unsustainable environmentally, which is inconsistent with proposed outcome, "Caring for the environment".
  I also note that there are several paper roads in the area which could perhaps be incorporated
  - I also note that there are several paper roads in the area which could perhaps be incorporated into a walkway/s.
- A walkway connecting Corsair Drive and Clendon Drive would be superb. We understand that the MaungatapereCommunity Led Project team have put aside \$45,000 for a feasibility study for this option. A very kind landowner is willing to donate land but the Project Team would need more funding to cover the costs of establishing the walkway. This would be an excellent opportunity for the Council to build on work and funding already in place, to be part of something that will make a difference for the residents of Maungatapere and in turn to meet community outcomes set out in the proposed LTP.
- I would like the Council to start insisting that subdivisions of an appropriate sizeset aside land for public use, and that the LTP provides the Council with funding to help to turn these into publicly accessible recreation areas. Opportunities have already been lost, for example, it is very disappointing that the bush in the Corsair Drive subdivision is no longer accessible to the general public, and only to residents of the new subdivision. I understand that this point overlaps with the District Plan, but regardless raise this here in the interests of continuity as this relates to the long term planning of our district.

way less than the final capital cost. Recent city projects which bear witness to this include: Pohe Island lifting bridge, Hundertwasser Art Museum, Hihiaua Cultural centre. \* Council has allocated \$12 million for the upgrading of Forum North without any detailed costing of how this money is to be spent. A well researched and value engineered proposal for the complete redevelopment of Forum North may well be possible for a cost within that of the draft LTP Option 1 (\$40 million). The redevelopment of Forum North to serve as both a theatre and conference complex would be a good use of resources and make a strong contribution to revitalisation of the city centre. \* In consideration of councils preferred option, I realise that it is not practical to provide detailed analysis of all proposals in the consultation document. However, the Oruku project appears to be included as an instant response to the promise of external funding rather than a response to a well researched and supported community demand. In conclusion, I submit that council should: Reinstate the 800+ seat theatre at Forum North into the LTP Use part of the committed funds and undertake a comprehensive study to clearly establish what and where is the best option for Gathering Spaces in Whangarei, before committing to an expensive and financially risky conference centre which may well be in the wrong location.

We wish to be heard

Homelessness is a reality in our community. Mostly hidden from public view, there is a concerning number of families and single people in Whangarei currently without a place to call home. They are living in overcrowded conditions, living in garages, tents and caravans or sleeping the night in their cars and vans.

Our experience, backed up by international research, shows that being without a home impacts a person's mental and physical well-being, employment prospects, ongoing education, the ability to make active choices and to participate well in community life. Everyone needs a place to call home in order to thrive. This is especially so for children. We believe that ensuring noone is without a home is a social and civic responsibility that every Council should be involved in playing an active role.

TTEHCT has been working in this space for the past 15 years and on average have contact with over 500 people every year in housing need. We are thankful for the links and ongoing financial support we receive from WDC. However, there has not been a time in our organisation's history when the housing crisis has been so dramatic and the people we are supporting have never been so desperate to find a suitable and affordable home to rent. We need to find new local ways of doing things together as a community to address this problem. Tackling our

current housing situation is too big for just one organisation to address so we need a plan to maximise the cooperation between central and local government and NGO's.

#### Therefore, we believe

- 1. developing an **affordable housing strategy** should be considered a necessary part of Council's Long-term Planning and have a dedicated line-in its budget to work on bringing about this strategy. This Strategy should include
- a project to identify the amount of affordable housing required to meet future demand in our city:
- a framework that sets out a plan how to meet that demand over the next-ten years
- host forum to bring together the different community organisations, landlords, property developers, central and local government to develop and achieve this plan
- actively encouraging the development of affordable housing projects in Whangarei, such as new property development requires a proportion to be built as more affordable housing;
- more flexibility in planning laws to allow and promote papakainga style housing in urban environment; multiple- homes on one site, or conversion of vacant commercial property to residential accommodation;
- identify and use of Council land for multiple low-cost cabins, tiny homes etc
- advocate to central government regarding strategies and initiatives to address issues surrounding affordable housing in Whangarei;
- continue to support community organisation working with the homeless and people requiring emergency and transitional housing;
  - 2) WDC should continue its involvement for housing for the elderly and look to expand its role as a landlord in niche markets,
- in particular we support the ongoing maintenance and upgrade to Pensioner Housing and support increasing Pensioner Housing stock even further given the projected growth in the elderly population in Whangarei;
- short-term lease of WDC owned property to transitional housing organisations (e.g. houses purchased for future roading projects);
- partner with NorthTec/ Te Wananaga Aotearoa to develop student accommodation

Our experience, backed up by international research, shows that being without a home impacts a person's mental and physical well-being, employment prospects, ongoing education, the ability to make active choices and to participate well in community life. Everyone needs a place to call home in order to thrive. This is especially so for children. We believe that ensuring no-one is without a home is a social and civic responsibility that every Council should be involved in playing an active role.

TTEHCT has been working in this space for the past 15 years and on average have contact with over 500 people every year in housing need. We are thankful for the links and ongoing financial support we receive from WDC. However, there has not been a time in our organisation's history when the housing crisis has been so dramatic and the people we are supporting have never been so desperate to find a suitable and affordable home to rent. We need to find new local ways of doing things together as a community to address this problem. Tackling our current housing situation is too big for just one organisation to address so we need a plan to maximise the cooperation between central and local government and NGO's.

#### Therefore, we believe

- developing an affordable housing strategy should be considered a necessary part
  of Council's Long-term Planning and have a dedicated line-in its budget to work on bringing
  about this strategy. This Strategy should include
- a project to identify the amount of affordable housing required to meet future demand in our city:
- a framework that sets out a plan how to meet that demand over the next-ten years
- host forum to bring together the different community organisations, landlords, property developers, central and local government to develop and achieve this plan
- actively encouraging the development of affordable housing projects in Whangarei, such
  as new property development requires a proportion to be built as more affordable housing;

- more flexibility in planning laws to allow and promote papakainga style housing in urban environment; multiple- homes on one site, or conversion of vacant commercial property to residential accommodation;

- advocate to central government regarding strategies and initiatives to address issues surrounding affordable housing in Whangarei;

Clean up the Meth users and other social problems on the footpaths and make them safe for children to walk to school. Organise a walking bus with responsible adult volunteers to walk with children to school. Get the many commuters who travel into town every day out of their cars by providing alternatives to their cars. WDC has demonstrated they are capable of buying large pieces of land to forward plan for an airport, they should do the same by purchasing land such as 238 Whangarei Heads Road, Tamaterau. This could be a park and ride facility with a lock up bike shelter for those who live in remote places, as I do, such as Whangarei Heads, Ruakaka, Waipu, Hikurangi and beyond. Workers could drive and park then either catch a reliable express bus into CBD or collect their bike from a secure bike lock up and ride to to work. At night either bus or cycle back to park and ride, lock up bike, drive home. Construct safe, continuous cycle paths around CBD and out to the regions. The existing bike paths around town are not safe. I know many people out at Whangarei Heads who would love to ride either all the way or part of the way to work. The bus service trial to Whangarei Heads was a joke, it was not for the workers and was set up to fail. A reasonably priced, reliable express ride from the regions into town would get people out of their cars.

extremely poor condition and then there is bumper to bumper traffic from Onerahi to riverside drive. Getting around CBD is also bad, parking reduces double lanes to two, concrete traffic islands installed in the road to hold signs warning about school zones also. Whangarei roads are appalling, less cars would generate savings in road maintenance.

As to waste reduction. A large part of the waste problem is the excessive packaging on purchased goods, excessive plastic on food, lack of recycling incentives and a need for public education. Bring back refunds for returning glass bottles and standard for recyclable packaging for manufacturers. The 3 options above are not adequate. I think some funding should be put towards these but wince at the prospect of WDC adding further charges to my already onerous rates - money used by Council for projects which are of no interest to me - I live at the coast I am interested in a clean harbour, not Hundertwasser, the rugby club, the bike park, the riverside. WDC declared a climate emergency in July 2019, nearly two years ago and seem to have done very little about it. I hope we do not see years of meetings and pondering like the Paris accord.

WDC boast about the great coastline here and I live at the coast. The harbor is filthy,

WDC allow new builds and existing homes to not connect to the sewer. Then they flush sewer collected into the harbor. I would prefer Council sort out the sewerage.

Stormwater, WDC divert stormwater into my property illegally as they are use my rate money for inner CBD projects instead of a stormwater pipe to stop destroying my property. This contributes to sedimentation and pollution of the harbor.

Why not incentivize building owners to take some pride in the existing buildings, they are in a terrible state. Part of the problems of city centre are social. Gangs of thuggish people hang around, spitting and using bad language. It is not unusual to observe fights and screaming matches. It is not unusual for members of the public to be assaulted or verbally abused. If WDC put in a good link bus service so visitors did not have to drive their cars into town, got help sorting out the social problems and got building owners to make the city centre it might be more appealing for people to visit.

## Tell us what you think - any further comments on key issues or other points raised in the Consultation document:

Not everyone wants to hang out in the CBD. You are asking the wrong questions. I only go to town for work. I live at Whangarei heads . I pay dog registration and you have provided a dog park in the city. Whangarei heads has dog restrictions over summer and no dog beach. There is a WDC owned park next to the McLeod Bay hall, that could be developed as the existing park gets quite full. There are smells of sewerage all around Whangarei heads and on the drive to CBD. Parua Bay appears to have an algal bloom, there have already has been a bloom at Mangawhai. Whangarei needs to be careful it does not become like Auckland, congested with traffic and beaches which are not safe to swim at. The harbor is being polluted with sediment and other toxins. The wharf on Stuart Road is used by people who spend all day there fishing and there is no toilet so they go in the bush or on the path.

There needs to be an underpass from Parua Bay school to the shops. Running red traffic lights is a favorite pastime of many drivers in Whangarei, I have seen pedestrians nearly hit a number of times, red light cameras need to be installed.

Inner CBD driving is a nightmare. There should be a flyover for Maunu road at the Lights with intersection with SH1. Lights in town do not synchronize, the double lanes of central ave at the lights intersection with water street function as a single as people park to shop outside the plant shop, a concrete island supporting a school zone sign on Selwyn Ave turns the double lanes into one and holds up traffic stuck behind cars turning right into Alexander Street, etc, there is a very long list. Suffice to say driving around CBD is a pastime to be avoided.

o I'd like WDC to provide funding and support/expertise to help us establish a cycleway/shared path in Maungatāpere. We have almost nowhere for people to walk for recreation, and cannot use the main roads because they are all state highways with endless logging trucks. Our nearest park is Barge Park. We need something here. There are several paper roads within the area that could be suitable for a cycleway, and perhaps also access for horse-riders, dog-walkers and other leisure users. There is one between Clendon Drive and SH14, another off Pukeatua Rd, and perhaps a walkway to join up Corsair Drive and Clendon Drive. The Community-Led Project team have put aside \$45,000 for a feasibility study for the Clendon Drive/Corsair Drive option, since a very kind landowner is willing to donate land, but they'd need more funding to cover the costs of establishing the walkway.

o I want the council to start insisting that all subdivisions donate some land for public use. Otherwise we will end up with a lot of places like Maungatāpere that keep expanding but have no land for playgrounds, public toilets etc. Other councils around NZ insist on this; ours currently just requests politely, so it doesn't happen – for example the subdivision in Corsair Drive where the bush is no longer accessible to the general public -only to residents of the new subdivision.

o I'd like WDC to help identify a possible route and funding source for a cycleway access between Maungatāpere and Whangārei.

o I'd like WDC to look at establishing a horse-riding trail on the council land at the end of Pukeatua Rd.

o I'd like WDC to look at establishing a mountain bike trail on the council land at the end of Pukeatua Rd.

o I'd like WDC to look at establishing walking trails on Maungatāpere Mountain, in consultation with local iwi.

Re: Consultation on Long Term Plan 2021-2031

Tena koutou katoa.

The Teal Bay Residents and Ratepayers' Association is grateful for the opportunity to present this submission on the draft *Long Term Plan 2021-2031 (LTP)* of the Whangarei District Council (WDC).

May we first of all congratulate you and the WDC staff for having put together an *LTP* that is clear and well thought out. An enormous amount of work has gone into it. Strategic planning is essential but not easy. The draft *LTP* reflects highly on all those who have worked to put it together.

The Association's mission is to care for the well-being of Teal Bay, not just for today's residents and ratepayers, but also for future residents and ratepayers and friends of Teal Bay, and in recognition of the endowment that Teal Bay has received from the past.

Accordingly, our submission on the draft *LTP* addresses issues that most immediately affect Teal Bay.

Before elaborating our submission, may I first of all express our satisfaction with the work of the WDC and our relationship with you. The Whangarei district is one of the best places in New Zealand, and therefore the world, in which to live, and the WDC has played an essential role in bringing about this high level of well-being. The WDC has done a lot for Teal Bay over the years – estuary protection, reserve maintenance and rehabilitation, roading, stormwater, street lighting and rubbish collection, to name but a few – and we hope that we have been reciprocating, not only by paying our rates on time, but also by co-operating with WDC staff and contractors and by caring for one another in Teal Bay to support our community's wellbeing without unnecessarily burdening public authorities.

Our submission focusses on three issues: (i) addressing projected seal level rises; (ii) controlling development; and (iii) improving the environmental quality of WDC-administered natural areas.

#### **Projected Sea Level Rises**

On page 30 of the section *Climate Change and Sustainability*, the *LTP Consultation Document* identifies as Option 2 an increase in funding to enable the WDC to *complete [climate change] risk assessments across more communities in our District.* Our Association considers that the completion of such risk assessments for all communities in the District within the period of the

*LTP* should be the highest priority of this section of the draft *LTP*. Such risk assessments will be essential for planning the future of coastal communities in our district, including Teal Bay, especially given the 10-year period of the *LTP*.

Such assessments are a collective good, in that they are very difficult to arrange privately and individually. Moreover, because there can be so much uncertainty in such assessments, it is essential that they are performed under the direction and quality control of the WDC.

We would hope that the WDC's funding could be reprioritized to enable such assessments to be made without increasing rates further, but to the extent that this were not practicable in the judgements of the WDC, our Association would support any WDC decision to increase rates for this purpose.

#### **Resource and Building Consents**

On pages 227- 231 of the *Supporting Documents for the LTP*, the performance measures for resource consents and building consents are suggested as being time- or completion-based. Our Association considers that the performance measures should be strengthened by adding measures that reflect community satisfaction e.g. the consents are supported ex post by > 95 percent of residents or ratepayers within 1 kilometre according to a survey.

Surveys are commonly used as performance indicators in both the public and private sectors, and nowadays can be conducted online at low cost.

Underlying our recommendation on this issue is our Association's recent experience of developers who are deliberately flouting the regulatory framework, obviously confident in their ability to manipulate it. In the case of Teal Bay, this has the potential to fundamentally damage the character of our community, both environmentally and socially, and it is essential that the defences against such conduct be strengthened. Our Association considers that our recommendation would strengthen the essential role of WDC staff in this regard.

#### **Natural Areas**

Pages 203-206 of the *Supporting Documents for the LTP* deal with parks and recreation, including *natural areas such as native bush, river and coastal margins and regenerating bushlands*. There are significant such natural areas in Teal Bay.

On page 204 are stated:

The management of natural areas plays an important role to maintain biodiversity, manage pests and ultimately be of benefit to our cultural and environmental wellbeing

and

Our Parks team supports community initiatives to improve biodiversity such as community planting days, as well as managing weeds and pests.

Our Association submits that this part of the *LTP* should be strengthened. We consider that there should be a stronger and more active relationship between community groups, such as our Association, and the WDC with respect to preserving and enhancing the environmental quality of the natural areas administered by the WDC. It should be reflected in memoranda of understanding

that form a clear basis for ongoing co-operation. It should encompass not only planting and the control of pests and weeds, as mentioned on page 204, but also the protection of wetlands and other natural treasures.

We therefore recommend that the LTP provide for the WDC to enter into memoranda of understanding with established and democratically-accountable community groups to co-operate in the preservation and enhancement of the environmental quality of the natural areas administered by the WDC.

Representatives of our Association would like to speak in support of our submission at the traditional hearing on April 13-14. We were unable to attend the local meetings recently because of work commitments in those evenings.
