#### Objectives

- 1. To present options following the feedback from discussions and briefings by elected members and Te Kārearea members
- To identify the initial proposal for adoption at the 24 June meeting, including:
  - total number of councillors
  - number and names of wards
  - confirmation of boundary changes and population numbers

'Representation arrangements are to be determined so as to provide fair and effective representation for individuals and communities' (LGC)

#### **Brief Background**

- FPP electoral system retained for 2022
- Māori wards to be established for 2022 and 2025
- Representation review now required 2021

#### How it works

- Prescribed formal process in LEA
- Complex process, need to get it right
  - legal compliance
  - documentation
  - community consultation
- Formal process 1 March 2021 20 December 2021



The numbers used to confirm number of General and Māori ward councilors, in all options, are provided by Stats NZ and the formula is detailed in the LEA.

The numbers from Stats NZ:

General Electoral Roll= 79,600 Maori Electoral Roll = 18,800 Total Population = 98,400


#### Representation Review 2021 – Current

#### **Current representation**

- mayor: elected district-wide
- 13 councillors elected from 6 wards
  - Bream Bay Ward: 2 councillors
  - Denby Ward: 3 councillors
  - Hikurangi-Coastal Ward: 2 councillors
  - Mangakahia-Maungatapere Ward: 1 councillor
  - Okara Ward: 4 councillors
  - Whangarei Heads Ward: 1 councillor
- no community boards



## Representation Review 2021 – Māori Ward



Options for Māori ward/s

- One district-wide ward (shown)
- Two wards

Te Kārearea and Te Huinga feedback supports **one** ward across the district.

Councillor feedback (from 12 May briefing)

- Options 1-5 presented
- Summary indications:
  - 1<sup>st</sup> preference Option 2 = 11
  - 2<sup>nd</sup> preference Option 2 = 3
  - 1<sup>st</sup> preference Option 4 = 4
  - 2<sup>nd</sup> preference Option 4 = 7
  - 2<sup>nd</sup> preference Option 3 = 4
  - Community boards evenly split

Te Kārearea feedback:

Collective preference Option 5, with 8 Councilors


Option 2 overall preference (with tweaks)



- Option 2 suggested tweaks:
  - Split Mangakahia-Maungatapere into rural north and south
  - Add Onerahi into Whangarei Heads
  - Hikurangi into Rural North
  - Look at 13 councillors in total
  - Adjust boundaries for Ruakaka and Hikurangi
  - Adjust large rural ward into two
  - Add extra ward



## Representation Review 2021 – Option 2 Adjusted



- Mayor: elected district-wide
- 12 councillors
  - 10 general councillors elected from 6 general wards:
    - North Coastal General (1)
    - Whangarei Heads General (1)
    - Whangarei Urban General (5)
    - Bream Bay General (1)
    - Hikurangi and Rural North General (1)
    - Maungatapere and Rural South General (1)
  - 2 Māori councillors elected from 1 Māori ward



#### Representation Review 2021 – Option 2 - summary

- Option 2, with suggested changes:
  - 12 councillors 10 general councillors, 2 Māori councillors
  - 6 general wards, 1 Māori wards
  - 79,600/10 general members = 7,960 + 10% = 7,164 8,756


Two wards not compliant with +/- 10% rule



#### Representation Review 2021 Option 2 - Discussion

- Retains wards
- Creates new ward names to align to communities
- Reduces councillor numbers (12), providing for uneven EM number (13)
- Groups like communities of interest
- Assumption that wards cover communities of interest so doesn't require community boards
- Two wards not meet +/- 10 % rule (North Coastal [-14%],
   Whangarei Heads [-21%]) but to comply would split communities
- Would create automatic review by LGC, but this is likely regardless as any submission will trigger a LGC review.

#### Representation Review 2021 - Option 4 Adjusted



- Mayor: elected district-wide
- 13 councillors
  - 11 general councillors elected from 6 general wards
    - Bream Bay General (2)
    - Denby General (2)
    - Hikurangi-Coastal General (2)
    - Mangakahia-Maungatapere General (1)
    - Okara General (3)
    - Whangarei Heads General (1)
  - 2 Māori councillors elected from 1 Māori ward




#### Representation Review 2021- Option 4 - Summary

- Option 4:
  - 13 councillors 11 general councillors, 2 Māori councillors
  - 6 general wards, 1 Māori ward
  - 79,600/11 general members = 7,236 + 10% = 6,512 7,959


Compliant with +/- 10% but splits communities of interest in Okara and Denby Whangarei

#### Representation Review 2021 Option 4 - Discussion



- Retains ward structure
- Retains current ward names
- Retains total councillor numbers (13)
- Splits communities of interest from Okara and Denby which may prompt review by LGC
- Assumption that wards cover communities of interest so doesn't require community boards
- meets +/- 10 % rule based on numbers

# Representation Review 2021 - Option 5 Adjusted



# Reduce councillor numbers to 8, one general ward and one Māori ward

- Mayor: elected district-wide
- 8 councillors
  - 6 general councillors elected from
     1 district-wide general ward
  - 2 Māori councillors elected from 1 district-wide Māori ward
- with/without community boards



# **Representation Review 2021-Option 5 - Summary**

- Option 5:
  - 8 general councillors, 2 Māori councillors
  - 1 general ward (district-wide)
  - 1 Māori ward (district-wide)
  - +/- 10% rule not applicable



#### Representation Review 2021 Option 5 - Discussion

- Two ward structure (1 general district-wide and 1 Māori district-wide)
- Removes current wards and names
- Reduces councillor numbers significantly (13 to 8)
- May require establishment of community boards as communities of interest are not represented
- +/- 10 % rule does not apply for district wide general or Māori wards
