Preamble

Te Kārearea Strategic Partnership Forum was formed late in 2012 between Te Huinga (as advocates of the hapū of Whangarei) and Whangarei District Council. The desire to 'develop more robust partnership arrangements over time' was signaled in the 2014 revision of the Agreement. This partnership Committee Represents an important step in that process. While the Purpose, Key Responsibilities and Delegations form the basis for the Terms of Reference to determine what the Committee will do, it is important that the respective principles of each of the Partners continue to underpin the relationship, and that the relationship builds on the foundations outlined in the Agreement. The Statement of Principles for each of the Partners, as established in the foundation relationship agreement, is below.

Te Huinga Statement of Principles

He Whakaputanga o Te Rangatiratanga o Nu Tireni (Declaration of Independence – 1835) and Te Tiriti o Waitangi, 1840 provides the foundational doctrines of authority and partnership that are being sought after by the hapū of Whangārei as the relationship develops with the Whangārei District Council.

Te Huinga will work towards achieving the strategic intent.

Strategic Intent

- Vision/Te Pae Tawhiti: 'Ma nga hapū ano nga hapū e korero' 'Hapū self reliance and prosperity'
- Mission/Te Kaupapa: 'Achieving hapū aspirations through effective and enduring relationships'
- Whangārei Māori Community Outcomes:
 - a A rohe with a vibrant Māori culture
 - b A Māori community, which is healthy and highly educated



- c A society that protects and cares for all its members
- d A rohe with a flourishing Māori economy
- e A society that appreciates and cares for its natural environment
- Nga tikanga Values
 - a Whanau the extended family is the social unit that Māori identify with.
 - b Mana Hapū Hapū are the cornerstone of the Māori community and identity.
 - c Mana Motuhake self-determination, self-reliance and self-sustainability.
 - d Whakarite Invest time and energy in building decision-making capacity and capability.
 - e Te Manawatoopu Of one heart and mind. We are stronger working together.
 - f Kia maia Providing leadership through courage.

Whangārei District Council Statement of Principles

In order to improve and enhance relationships with Māori, Council acknowledge a strategic platform is required upon which to continue to build strong relationships. Council is committed to collaboration with Māori organisations within the District.

Council has a contribution to make towards Māori wellbeing, be it environmental, social, cultural/spiritual or economic. Additionally, further collaboration and relationship building processes with Crown agencies and other local territorial authorities will continue as all such organisations make up part of the many services that impact on Māori wellbeing.

Whangārei District Council wishes to engage with Māori hapū and to recognize the Treaty of Waitangi. The Local Government Act 2002 outlines the obligations of local authorities around the Treaty of Waitangi.

Purpose

To enable the primary partners (Council and hapū of Whangārei) to work closely together to achieve the agreed vision 'He Whenua Rangatira - Whangārei, a district of prosperity, wellbeing and empowered communities' and mission 'Ka tūtuki te Kāwanatanga ā-rohe, ka puāwai hoki te kotahitanga me ōna tini kaupapa - Local Government that works through effective partnership and shared decisions to provide practical solutions'. Central to this is continued development of robust partnerships through learning conversations.

The Committee provides a platform for high level/strategic discussions and priority setting between the primary partners, with preference given to *kanohi ki te kanohi (*face-to-face) and preserving tikanga. Areas of focus include, but are not limited to;

- Identifying the cultural, economic, environmental, and social issues/decisions of Council that are significant for Māori¹ in the Whangarei District. (participation)
- Ensuring Council complies with statutory provisions that refer to Te Tiriti o Waitangi (the Treaty of Waitangi), including providing oversight of key processes and controls (assurance)
- To agree mutual strategic priorities (direction)

However, it is acknowledged that areas of focus/priorities may be beyond the direct control of the committee, meaning that in some areas it will be operating in an advisory capacity.

Recognising this, and to ensure clarity, the Working Group for Maori Participation in decision making (which was tasked with developing Terms of Reference) split the responsibilities of

the Committee into those where it provides advice and recommendations, and those where decision making powers would be delegated.

Key responsibilities - advice and recommendations

- 1) Participation
 - a) Develop pathways (and processes) that will achieve lasting and meaningful relationships between Māori and Council.
 - b) Ensure the views of Māori are taken into account.
 - c) Recommend ways to develop Council capacity
 - d) Recommend ways to develop Māori capacity to contribute to decision making processes
 - e) Governance oversight of initiatives, Te Karearea budget and resourcing to build capacity (both Council and Māori) and deliver on the Terms of Reference
 - f) Provide for equitable participation
- 2) Direction
 - a) Identify strategic priorities for the partnership
 - b) Provide advice on topics referred by Council and Māori
 - c) Advice to, and relationships with, other committees of Council
 - d) Recommendations on harbour and waterway matters (within the jurisdiction of WDC)
 - e) Advice and recommendations on 3 Waters and flood protection infrastructure
 - f) Oversight and advice on central government reform initiatives relating to strategic priorities of the partnership and Te Ao Māori including, but not limited to, three waters reform
 - g) Provide advice and recommendations on key strategic policies, plans and projects of Council, including but not limited to growth strategies, the Long Term Plan and the District Plan
 - h) Information sharing / discussions on Treaty Settlement processes and potential cogovernance opportunities (where appropriate)
 - i) Identify matters of significance to Māori that may require joint positions/advocacy with external agencies (i.e. co-governance) or recommendations to Council
 - j) Recommendations on Maori Representation (i.e. under the Local Electoral Act)
- 3) Assurance
 - a) Develop a workplan and strategy log to monitor input to, and decision making/progress on, strategic priorities identified by the Committee
 - b) Monitor and advise on council's compliance with its legislative obligations to Māori, including under the Local Government Act 2002 and the Resource Management Act 1991.
 - c) Receive and consider audit reports on Council's compliance with its legislative obligations
 - d) Monitor and ensure that appropriate action is being taken
 - e) Monitor and assess the primary partner relationship against its vision and mission
 - f) Monitoring compliance with statutory provisions that refer to Te Tiriti o Waitangi (the Treaty of Waitangi), including providing oversight of key processes and controls



Key Responsibilities – under Delegated authority

- 1) Establishing Audit Processes for statutory provisions relating to Te Tiriti o Waitangi (the Treaty of Waitangi).
- 2) Establishing Council processes and templates for Mana whakahono ā rohe Agreements and Iwi/Hapu Environmental Management Plans
- 3) Developing a Te Ao Maori framework for decision making
- 4) Establishment of working parties or steering groups
- 5) Nominating hapū representatives to any Council committee, joint committee or working group (as required, noting that nominations to Council Committees or Joint Committees must then be appointed by full Council)
- 6) Developing collaborative relationships on strategic priorities/areas of focus



5. Kokiri: Progressive Partnership Action - July 2021

1 Purpose

To progress topics for 'Kokiri': Progressive Partnership Action.

2 Recommendation

That the Te Kārearea Strategic Partnership Hui notes the report.

3 Background

Following hui between Te Kārearea and Te Huinga hapū proposed the establishment of a standing agenda item on the Te Kārearea Agenda.

The intent of the item is to bring forward strategic topics or initiatives Te Huinga and Te Kārearea hapū members want to elevate with Council.

Titled "Kokiri" to denote progressive (strategic) action, the item provides an opportunity for collective discussion on initiatives aligned to the Committee's Terms of Reference.

4 Discussion

Te Kārearea Strategic Partnership Standing Committee Terms of Reference outlines key responsibilities under the 'Participation' section as:

- a) Developing pathways (and processes) that will achieve lasting and meaningful relationships between Māori and Council
- b) Ensuring the views of Māori are taken into account
- c) Recommending ways to develop Council capacity
- d) Recommending ways to develop Māori capacity to contribute to decision-making processes

In addition, the Committee has "Governance oversight of initiatives, Te Kārearea budget and resourcing to build capacity (both Council and Māori) and deliver on the Terms of Reference" and is tasked with developing a workplan to track progress on strategic initiatives.

Kokiri provides a mechanism for capacity building initiatives to be brought to the Committee for debate and the establishment of a collective view. It also provides for Committee oversight of, and direction on, these initiatives.

4.1 Initial area of focus – Wananga

At the Te Karearea meeting in December 2020 the Te Kārearea Strategic Partnership Standing Committee endorsed 'a Marae based wananga to build capacity/understanding in Te Ao Māori'.

A working party of Aorangi Kawiti, Jade Kake, Cr Carol Peters and Cr Ken Couper was initially established to plan for this. Since then, Jade has signalled that her availability is limited to attending the wananga but not planning the wananga. Additional support from Te Kārearea and staff might be required to support the delivery of this wananga.

The wananga will run over 2 full days (and overnight) with the timeframes and agenda to be confirmed at a later date. Matua Rereata Makiha was asked and has agreed to facilitate the wananga. The initial date set for early July did not suit Matua Rereata. The following dates have been offered by Matua Rereata as potential alternatives and distributed to Te Kārearea members:

- Thursday 29th July
- Friday 6 August
- Friday 13 August.

4.2 Kokiri Actions Identified by Te Huinga in July 2021

Attachment 1 includes the email on behalf of Te Huinga raising matters for inclusion in this month's Kokiri report.

Pukearengarenga maunga	To request support from Te Kārearea in opposing an application to quarry Pukearengarenga maunga. Concerns regarding the impacts of quarrying on the maunga and the cultural landscape has been discussed with Te Huinga. Te Huinga support Rosie Wellington's request to elevate this matter to Te Kārearea and the intention to seek support from Te Kārearea to request that the application for quarrying is not accepted for lodgement. These matters are discussed further in Attachment 2 and images submitted by Rosie Wellington are included in Attachment 3 .
	Staff comments Unless an activity is Prohibited then an applicant is within their rights to submit an application. The Regional Council and District Council is required to accept an application for lodgement if it meets the criteria of being a full and complete application and then assess the application against the relevant provisions.

Vinegar Hill Road - Transport safety	The development opposite the gates of Te Kura Kaupapa Maori o Te Rawhitiroa has compromised the safe manoeuvring of buses leaving the kura. The buses turning out from Te Kura Kaupapa Maori o Te Rawhitiroa need to undertake a 3 point turn.
	Staff comments
	This is may be most appropriately addressed through a CRM process. We have requested staff contact the Kura to explain the process.
Vinegar Hill Road - Engagement	There has not been the expected engagement with the kura/kohanga reo or residents in terms of large pond being built opposite Te Kura Kaupapa Maori o Te Rawhitiroa gates.
	Staff comments
	This is may be most appropriately addressed through a CRM process. We have requested staff contact the Kura to explain the process.

Ko Pukearengarenga taku maunga Ko Ngunguru me Tutukaka te awa Ko Waikanohi te whenua Ko Ngati Takapari te hapu Ko Rose Wellington/Tana taku ingoa

Tena koutou

Pukearengarenga is the maunga inbetween Ngunguru and Tutukaka. It is the maunga of Ngati Takapari and is of huge significance to our hapu of Ngati Takapari and other hapu. It has koiwi of a number of iwi and hapu within it from many many years back and has a number of significant sites on both Tutukaka and Ngunguru side.

I sent a plea via email to iwi and whanau whanui for support to stop the proposed application to further quarrying on our maunga and the proposed removal of 300,000 cubic metres of metal .

The Ngunguru side of Pukearengarenga is safe from application to quarry because it is whenua Maori.

It is not safe however from the proposed extraction hole as it butts up against the boundary and explosive materials being used to loosen the metal will destabilise our side of the maunga and it will fall.

The quarrying will also destroy the water supply we have had as ahikaroa mai rano. That wai feeds part of one of the significant sites.

The application to further quarry the maunga has not reached Council yet and now is the time to lobby Council to not accept rather than hope for an opportunity to place submissions after they accept the application.

I request tautoko from the table Te Karearea to go to Council asking them to not accept the application or to allow further quarrying on that site.

6.4 Mangawhai Water report

1 Purpose

To inform the Te Kārearea Strategic Partnership Hui about an approach relating to extending the water supply network to Mangawhai

2 Background

Water Services have been approached by a developer from Mangawhai wishing to extend the water supply network from Langs beach to their development in Central Mangawhai. The developer is anticipating that their development will have a peak demand of approximately 1,000m3 of water per day within 10 years. There is also the possibility to supply water to the wider Mangawhai area which is currently served with rainwater tanks. It is anticipated this could take the total demand up to around 3,000m3 per day within 30 years.

With the expected closure of the Refinery at Marsden Point it is anticipated that the Bream Bay Water Supply area will have a surplus of water of around 4,000m3 per day. The loss of the Refinery will create potential problems within the network as reduced demand will mean water in some pipes will move very slowly, particularly between Ruakaka and Waipu. This may lead to water quality problems and network management issues.

However, the southern part of the Bream Bay network has been designed to supply water only as far as Langs Beach. The pipe network is too small to provide for even an additional 1,000m3 per day without significant upgrades. The developer has indicated they would be willing to contribute towards the extension of the network and the upgrade of the system.

In order to service Mangawhai a pump station would need to be constructed at Langs Beach to pump water to a reservoir on top of the hill above Mangawhai so the water could then gravity feed down to the development and the wider Mangawhai area. The distance between the end of the Langs Beach network and the development is 11km. Water Services have undertaken some network modelling to determine what will be required and the size of any upgrades to our network. The modelling shows that for the initial stages of the development the existing pipes would have to be upgraded at least as far back as Waipu Cove, approximately 4.5km. For the final scope of the development and any additional allowance for Mangawhai growth the pipelines would need to be upsized all the way back to Shoemaker Road pump station, an additional distance of approximately 9.5km.

There are also a number of engineering challenges which need to be overcome. The main one is finding a suitable reservoir site at the high point alongside the road going over the hill into Mangawhai. Maintaining a chlorine residual whilst minimising disinfection by product formation will also require careful consideration. We also have limited space for additional reservoir storage at our existing sites at Waipu and Langs Beach. The developer is well progressed with their subdivision process and are suggesting that October is that date when they will need an answer and agreement regarding this proposal. They do have an alternate option to take water from two local streams and construct their own water treatment plant. However, their preference is to connect to the WDC Network system.

Initial discussions with KDC staff would indicate they would be in favour of the proposal. However, like ourselves they have no funds within the LTP. The decision on the pipe sizes depends entirely on whether allowance is made to provide water to the wider Mangawhai and Mangawhai Heads, current and growth communities. It would be unusual to install so much infrastructure for just one development when the surrounding area has no water supply and the townships are growing fast. It is suggested that if the wider area was to be included in future demand predictions that a cap should be placed on any supply agreement. If that cap was 3,000m3 per day then this proposal would be taking less water that the current Refinery demand.

3 Discussion

We understand that moving water between rohe and catchments is not normally consistent with tikanga and consider this is good opportunity to raise the issue at this forum. We have had initial talks with Patuharakeke but have yet to have any detailed discussions. We have not contacted Te Uri o Hau but believe that Kaipara District Council will be doing this shortly. The next stage would be to develop a memorandum of understanding with the developer and Kaipara District Council to cover further investigations. Discussions with hapu would form part of the next stage.

6.6 Representation Review Update July 2021

Meeting:	Te Kārearea Strategic Partnership Hui

1 Purpose

To update Te Kārearea on the progress of the representation review and the initial proposal, which is currently out for consultation.

2 Background

The Local Electoral Act 2001 (LEA) requires local authorities to undertake a review of their representation arrangements at least once every six years. Council last reviewed its representation arrangements in 2018. On 3 November 2020 Council resolved to establish Māori wards for the 2022 and 2025 triennial elections, necessitating a review of the representation arrangements in 2021, with the outcome to apply for the 2022 triennial elections.

A joint Council and Te Kārearea briefing was held on 4 March 2021 providing an overview of the representation review process. A further hui with Te Kārearea was held on 17 March 2021.

The Local Government Commission (LGC) recommends that Councils undertake informal preliminary public consultation to seek feedback on representation arrangements from the community in order to assist Council in identifying options. From 7 April to 7 May, an informal survey was held to seek community views on our current representation.

On 1 April 2021, Council was briefed on the considerations and principles to consider when undertaking a representation review. Some potential approaches / scenarios were discussed at the briefing on 1 April 2021.

Based on community, hapū (through Te Huinga and Te Karearea) and Council feedback, 10 different options were considered and tested against the requirements of the Local Electoral Act 2001.

Council's Electoral Officer, Dale Ofsoske and council staff worked through 10 possible scenarios based on Council feedback from the 1 April briefing. 6 of these possible scenarios did not align with legislative requirements for fair representation. 5 possible options (from feedback provided at the 1 April briefing) were identified and mapped. At the joint Council and Te Kārearea briefing held on 12 May, further detail on the 5 possible options was provided along with the results of the informal survey to inform further considerations.

The agenda and minutes of the joint Council and Te Kārearea briefing on 12 May includes a summary of the feedback received from the informal survey and options that were discussed along with the preferred options identified in the 12 May briefing.

At the Council meeting on 24th June 2021 two proposals were presented to Elected Members to determine which would become the initial proposal.

The two proposals presented for discussion were

- modified status quo, and
- Reduced Council, District wide

The proposal for the modified status quo is detailed here:

- Mayor (elected district wide).
- 13 councillors in total comprised of:

o 11 general ward councillors elected from 5 general wards:

o 2 Māori ward councillors elected from 1 district wide Māori ward.

- Retains the existing Bream Bay ward, represented by two councillors with some boundary changes.
- Retains the existing Hikurangi-Coastal ward, represented by two councillors with some boundary changes.
- Retains the existing Mangakahia-Maungatapere ward, represented by one councillor with some boundary changes.
- Retains the existing Whangarei Heads ward, represented by one councillor with some boundary changes.
- Combines the existing Denby and Okara wards into one Whangarei Urban General ward, represented by five councillors with a new ward boundary.
- Creates a single district wide Māori ward, represented by two councillors
- No community boards

The proposal for reduced council, district wide is detailed here:

- Mayor (elected district wide).
- 8 councillors in total.
- Two-ward structure
- 6 general councillors elected district wide from 1 general district-wide ward.
- 2 Māori ward councillors elected district-wide from 1 district wide Māori ward.
- Removes current wards and ward names.
- With community boards.

The reduced council proposal had support from Te Kārearea and Te Huinga.

The final decision was for the current Elected Members to make and the Council resolved that the modified status quo would become the initial proposal. The initial proposal is now out for consultation.

3 Discussion

Council is now engaging with the community on the proposed representation arrangement for our district in the Initial Proposal:

Retain the existing number of 13 councillors in total comprised of:

- 11 general ward councillors elected by ward
- 2 Māori ward councillors elected within one district-wide ward
- Plus the Mayor elected at large.
- Council is proposing that we do not establish community boards.

The consultation period on this Initial Proposal opened on 30 June 2021 and will close on 30 July 2021. The attached initial proposal, including the submission form, explains the changes that are proposed.

Council is now following the timeline identified below in accepting submissions, reviewing and hearing submissions, undertaking deliberations on the submissions and reviewing the initial proposal to create a final proposal that will be submitted to the LGC.

WHAT IS A REPRESENTATION REVIEW? HE AHA TE AROTAKE WHAKAAHUATANGA?

Every three years elections are held for councils. To make sure we have fair and effective representation at these elections, councils are required by the Local Electoral Act 2001 to review their representation arrangements at least once every six years.

Our Council held a representation review in 2018, but when Whangarei District Council voted in favour of establishing Māori wards, it triggered the need for a representation review in 2021.

A representation review looks at how many councillors there should be for our District and how they should be elected – deciding whether councillors are elected from wards or 'at large' across the whole district, or by a mix of both. It also looks at the boundaries and names of wards, communities of interest and whether or not we should have community boards.

A review of representation arrangements also needs to consider our growing population, and ensure that our communities are represented fairly, with each councillor representing the same number of people.

During this review, Whangarei District Council considers three key factors:

- What are our District's communities of interest?
- How can those communities be effectively represented?
- How can those communities be fairly represented?

WHAT WE HAVE NOW HE AHA KEI A MĀTOU I TĒNEI WĀ

Right now, Whangarei District is represented by 13 councillors plus the Mayor, elected by ward. As your representatives, they make decisions about our District on your behalf. We currently do not have community boards.

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CURRENT WARD STRUCTURE

WHAT YOU'VE TOLD US

During April and May, we held an informal survey asking the community for feedback on the way our Council represents the district.

- Most people viewed the whole of the Whangārei District as their community of interest.
- Most people felt that the current wards do not reflect their community of interest.
- Most people want our district to be divided into wards.
- Most people want to retain our current ward structure (6 general wards plus Māori wards to be established).
- Most people are happy with the names of our current wards.
- Most people want to retain our current number of councillors (13 councillors plus the Mayor).
- Most people prefer to elect councillors where they live.
- The community was evenly divided on whether to establish Community Boards.

WHAT WE LOOKED AT

Based on community, hapū and Council feedback, we looked at 11 different options and we've tested all of those options against the requirements of the Local Electoral Act 2001.

In developing these options, we considered:

- The number of councillors we should have.
- How councillors are elected (by ward or district wide).
- How many people are represented by each councillor.
- Whether our communities would be fairly and effectively represented.
- How many wards we should have and the names of these wards.
- How Māori wards will be established and structured.
- Whether any changes to wards or ward boundaries are needed.
- Whether we should have community boards and how these should be set up.

WHAT WE'RE PROPOSING E WHAKATAKOTORIA ANA E MĀTOU

After considering the different options, Council is recommending the following representation for our district:

COUNCILLORS

We are proposing:

13 councillors in total: 11 general ward councillors elected by ward, 2 Māori ward councilors elected by one district-wide ward, plus the Mayor elected at large.

Why:

This keeps the same number of councillors as what we currently have, which is in line with early community feedback and ensures effective representation of communities in our District.



COMMUNITY BOARDS

We are proposing:

That we do not establish community boards.

Why:

The community is effectively represented by councillors elected from the ward they represent. The establishment of community boards would mean a cost to the ratepayer for the remuneration of community board members, and additional costs for support and governance of community boards which would be ratepayer funded.

WARDS

We are proposing:

Six wards in total:

- Five General Wards:
 - Bream Bay General Ward
 - Hikurangi-Coastal General Ward
 - Mangakahia-Maungatapere General Ward
 - Whangārei Heads General Ward
 - Whangārei Urban General Ward

CHANGES TO WARDS



Whangārei Urban General Ward

The proposal is:

 to combine the current Denby and Okara Wards to create one Whangārei Urban General Ward.

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Why:

Historically, the Whangārei urban/city area has been divided into two wards, Denby and Okara. Feedback from the community is that urban/city residents view the Whangārei urban/city area as one area. The creation of one Whangārei Urban General Ward could provide more effective representation for residents in the Whangārei urban/city area. This would also allow residents in this area to have more candidate options when electing councilors.

The proposal is:

• to establish one Whangārei District Māori Ward across our District represented by two Māori Ward councillors.

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Why?

During the representation review process, the structure and form of Māori representation was considered by Council and our hapū partners, Te Huinga and Te Kārearea Strategic Partnership Standing Committee. The establishment of one district-wide Māori Ward was determined as the best option for representation of Māori across our District. As with general wards, electors enrolled on the Māori electoral roll must be fairly and effectively represented as prescribed in the Local Electoral Act.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS ĒTAHI PĀTAI, ĒTAHI WHAKAUTU

WHY DID COUNCIL ADOPT THIS PROPOSAL AS ITS INITIAL PROPOSAL?

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- It ensures that there is fair representation across the whole district (based on population).
- It aligns with our communities of interest.
- It ensures that our communities of interest are fairly and effectively represented.
- It largely reflects early views from our community.
- It complies with the requirements of the Local Electoral Act 2001 for fair and effective representation.

WHAT IS MEANT BY A COMMUNITY OF INTEREST?

A 'community of interest' is the community people associate with most. Whangarei District has an urban city surrounded by rural farmland, towns and coastal communities.

WAS CONSIDERATION GIVEN TO COUNCILLORS BEING ELECTED 'AT LARGE' (ACROSS THE WHOLE DISTRICT RATHER THAN BY WARD)?

Yes, but this doesn't take communities of interest into account and may not ensure effective representation of our rural and coastal communities.

DID COUNCIL CONSIDER CHANGING THE 'FIRST PAST THE POST' VOTING SYSTEM AS PART OF THIS REVIEW?

No, the voting system is not part of this review. Council decided in August 2020 to retain the 'First Past the Post' voting system. This will be in place for the 2022 election.

WHAT IS A MĀORI WARD?

Māori wards are wards where electors enrolled on the Māori electoral roll for the 2022 elections will vote for and be represented by candidates standing in a Māori ward. Māori wards sit alongside the general wards.

WHO CAN STAND FOR ELECTION IN A MAORI WARD?

Candidates in Māori wards do not have to be of Māori descent. Candidates cannot stand for the general and Māori wards at the same time.

CAN ELECTORS ON THE MĀORI ELECTORAL ROLL VOTE FOR CANDIDATES IN GENERAL WARDS AND VICE VERSA?

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No. You can only vote for candidates in the ward you are enrolled in (general or Māori). All electors from the general and Māori wards are able to vote for the Mayor.

WHICH ELECTORAL ROLL SHOULD YOU ENROLL IN?

If you are of Māori descent, you can enroll either in either the general or the Māori electoral rolls. If you are not of Māori descent, you can only enroll on the general electoral roll.

DO MÃORI WARD COUNCILLORS ONLY REPRESENT MÃORI?

No. All councillors - whether elected from general or Māori wards - represent the entire community in our District.

CAN I WAIT AND SEE WHAT THE FINAL PROPOSAL IS BEFORE I MAKE MY VIEWS KNOWN?

If you have a view on the Initial Proposal this is your opportunity to share it. Your view will be taken into account when Council considers submissions on the Initial Proposal in order to formalise the Final Proposal. If you don't like Council's final proposal, you can lodge an appeal to the Local Government Commission.

1 Purpose

To introduce the Whenua Maori Expo collaboration between local government and central government agencies in Northland to support owners of Maori Land to have access to information and staff that affect their land.

To seek guidance from Te Kārearea on what information Whangarei District Council can provide to help owners of Maori Land wherever they are on their journey and aspects that will support the delivery of the event.

2 Background

Kath Taurua from the Maori Land Court is leading the collaboration between local government and central government agencies in Northland to run a series of Whenua Maori Expos in Kaitaia, Dargaville, Kaikohekohe and Whangarei. The purpose of the Expos is to support owners of Maori Land to have access to information that affects or relates to their land and to staff have knowledge in those areas. This is a really important kaupapa for us to support and there is the potential for this initial round of events to become an annual event. The following parties are involved, with potential to expand to other agencies in due course.
