Concerns about POSSIBLE changes to CAA rules, possible limited runway length for future aircraft are outlined in your document but they are all speculative and you have not addressed any possible mitigations to those potential issues of which there are many and you have not adequately outlined specific quantifiable reasons for moving the site so from those perspectives this is not a transparent process and difficult to comment on but if you are serious about community stakeholder input than this level of detail must be supplied to allow comment and feedback.

What else do we need to consider at this site?

You have not addressed any issues that may arise from the Governments Climate Change Emission Reduction Plan recently released which appears to not directly address aircraft under transportation and any possible impacts this plan or future policy or plans will have on aircraft and consequently airports. At some stage this will be addressed specifically by government and will have an impact on requirements.

If at some speculative time in the future Air New Zealand aircraft are unable to land because of runway length what are the options for an independent operator to set up flights in aircraft that are able to use the existing runway and feed into the Air New Zealand service as clearly there are aircraft are available that are able to and have been

- 5. Building the first new district airport in NZ in 50 years is NOT a reason to go ahead.
- 6. Spending \$150m plus on a new airport based on what has been presented in this report would be a travesty.
- 7. The first statement in the study referred to "the future of air transport is vital to support the long term economic security of Northland" but that is just a statement with no supporting context so you have not outlined a business, social, environmental security case for spending \$150m or moving the airport.

I would imagine that if anybody does even read this email it will be an aide or assistant but having just completed my personal submission

as an 11 year resident of Whangarei living off Three Mile Bush Rd on the Airport Location Study I felt I wanted to follow up directly.

Reading the documentation provided and doing some additional research and study including review a Noise Mitigation plan for the current airport written some years ago, this exercise of asking for public feedback even though it is required, feels like lip service, especially when looked at in the light of demonstrable results of the limited if any impact

public input as had on many projects around New Zealand over the last 10 years.

While all of the invested parties, officials, organisations and consultants have real power to control and influence the process there is no real mechanism for the local community to significantly impact the decision making process unless you go to court possibly.

For example if the majority of the Whangarei residents said they were against moving the airport would you still go ahead?

If all the people who will actually be making the decision had the choice would they choose to wake up the next morning living next to an airport?

The information provided to the public in the study for comment is extremely limited and does not in my opinion make a very strong or compelling case to spend \$150m plus on a new airport. Until that information is provided with a range of options and mitigations for the proposed speculative issues it is difficult to provide informed and in depth feedback which is another reason why this feels like going through the motions so we can see we asked the public.

The main comment I would like to make though is that as somebody much smarter than me said "this whole exercise seems like a significant failure of imagination".

In the light of what we have learned from the COVID impact on transportation and economics over the last two years and possible impacts in the future,

In terms of the Climate Change Emissions Plan recently released and future updates and specific plans addressing aircraft when they are announced,

In terms of improvements to the road between Auckland and Whangarei, possible railroad developments, possible opportunities with Marsden Point and what that may mean in terms of transportation requirements and changes,

In terms of significant changes to the technology of transportation that is currently underway and will only further develop over the coming years,

the statements, issues and possibilities mentioned in the Airport Study seem limited, confined by status quo thinking, bureaucratic constraints and processes and from my discussions with people continue to provide ammunition for

why there is ongoing decline in faith in council, government and traditional authority in their ability and willingness to make decisions and deliver for the wellbeing of the community not vested interests,

which feels like a shame and a waste of a tremendous opportunity to be an example of a new way to address the serious issues we have as a society today.

Takahiwai Marae, of Patuharekeke, is located to the west of the proposed airport site and Poupouwhenua (Marsden/Ruakaka) is an area of cultural significance There are at least two scheduled culturally significant sites nearby to the proposed location as well as other sites indicated in volume 3d: Archaeological &Historic Heritage Values. Section 6 of the RMA recognises as matters of importance ' the relationship of Maori and their culture and traditions with their ancestral lands, waters, sites waahi tapu ant other taonga (S6(c)): and the protection of historic heritage from inappropriate subdivision, use, and development(S6(f)). This therefore means the development of this site for an airport would be in breach of WDC obligations in terms of the Treaty of Waitangi and Section 6 of the RMA.

The surrounding area is home to taonga such as a population of native flora and fauna including bats, birds and lizards who visit the area of this site. There are wild life reserves in the area and The Wildlife Act 1953 Section 14(3) states that it is an offence "to do anything likely to cause any wildlife to leave the wildlife refuge." This is an enforceable provision under the Act and solid evidence that an airport in this site should not go ahead.

The One Tree Point West (Site24a) has a potentially higher impact on the local population as this area has a higher population density compared with other site options. This means issues of noise, congestion and pollution would be harder to mitigate. There are other loud noise generating activities in the area so there would be an accumulation of noise from numerous sources. This noise would impact not only the local residence but also the residence of Whangarei Heads. Therefore the communities would have a larger total noise disturbance than other sites that do not already have noise generating activities. The higher population density also means more people could possibly be impacted by more intensive light pollution. There are more at risk priority populations in this area such as marae, retirement homes, schools, or churches that would adversely impacted. The land is not suitable geological for development and would incur possible time delays and financial costs that would be involved in removal of peat which is not required in other areas. This area is in a tsunami evacuation site. There was considerable traffic congestion during the evacuation on 6 March 2021 in the Ruakaka/One Tree Point area. An airport would add to this issue. Having the airport at another site that is not in a Tsunami evacuation zone therefore guarantees the safety of this important transportation link during such a civil defence emergency. This site is at risk from possible costal inundation and therefore is not future proofed from this hazard. This site would face Three waters issue in this area.

The river running through the site identified is valuable, previously identified as a SNA, and the airport would damage, and likely destroy this precious ecosystem (flora/fauna). This ecosystem has several endangered species not mentioned by the council in their documents, nor was the fact that this river runs eventually into the Mangere river to the Northern Wairoa river, and then into the Kaipara Harbour - thus effecting not only the local properties, but another council region.

What do you think are the benefits of this site?

There are no benefits to this site.

What are your key concerns about this site?

Many of these concerns are by and large the same for both proposed Ruatangata Sites (Site 6 and Site 9).

Like any typical rural community, there is a lack of infrastructure at Ruatangata to support a major development such as an airport.

No town water supply.

No town sewerage services. No stormwater or planned drainage. Indeed, there is not even fibre for highspeed internet at Ruatangata.

Will the airport use water tanks for drinking water and septic or biocycle type systems for sewerage like most of the residents in Ruatangata currently do? I very much doubt it, and the massive cost to ratepayers of extending these services to Ruatangata is frankly irresponsible.

On top of that, the roading access to Ruatangata via Kamo or Maunu will require significant upgrading to provide safe carriage for the increase in traffic - remember that many of the drivers may never have driven these country roads before. This would be another massive cost for this project. On top of that, at peak times of the day both Maunu and Kamo are already highly congested. Presumably many air travellers to Whangarei will commute to and from the CBD, what are the benefits of flying into Whangarei to then just be stuck in traffic?

The one lane bridge over the Mangere Stream at the Ruatangata end of Kokopu Road and also areas of Kara Road are very prone to flooding and are often impassable due to heavy rainfall. These issues will need to be fixed at further cost to the project.

Another major safety consideration is the Sunstrike on both the Kamo and Maunu routes in early morning and later in the afternoon/evening. With the East-West general direction of these routes, at the times of day when the sun is low in the sky there are a number of stretches on these roads where the sun is completely blinding. With the increase in traffic that the airport will bring coupled with the unfamiliarity to these roads for many of the motorists making their way too and from the airport, the Sunstrike could lead to serious accidents. Note that many cyclists currently use the roads around Ruatangata, and there has already been at least one recorded death of a cyclist where the motor vehicle driver who hit her stated that Sunstrike was the reason that he did not see her on the road at all prior to the accident.

In the Proposal document it states that there "are no officially scheduled sites of cultural significance" for either of the proposed Ruatangata sites. A member of the local Hapu from the Ruatangata area attended and spoke at the Ruatangata community meeting on 19 May 2022 - based on that, it is apparent there are definitely sites of cultural significance in the area that will be affected by either of the two potential airport developments. Much heightened efforts by Council to engage with the Hapu of the Ruatangata area will be required to ensure these sites are identified or scheduled.

The final point I would like to make is about the residents of the Ruatangata area. The people who choose this area as their home are either people who work the local land (farmers or horticulturalists), or lifestyle block owners. For the most part, these people have chosen to live in this rural location to get away from large infrastructure such as the proposed airport. There are several obvious detrimental affects that the proposed airport development would have on the local Ruatangata residents if either site 6 or site 9 was chosen, such as:

Noise Pollution
Air Pollution
Light Pollution
Increased Traffic Congestion
Loss of Privacy
Reduction in Property Values
Pollution of Drinking Water

The last point above could pose a very serious health risk. As most properties in the area rely on harvested rainwater from their roofs, the health impact of air pollution from aircraft emissions goes beyond the direct natural environment. It will directly affect residents drinking water.

I am concerned that as the Council has only purchased land at Ruatangata thus far, the

decision may already have been made and Council is just ticking the boxes in the consultation period. I am hoping this is indeed not the case.

Based on all of the above, I recommend that the Council adopt option 4 of the proposal and leave the airport at Onerahi, with a \$150 Million saving to ratepayers.

I would be very surprised if Council chose to progress investigations into either of the Ruatangata sites 6 or 9.

Fog is a significant factor for Ruatangata site 6. I have been told that since the 16th February 2022 there has been 35 days of fog at the Ruatangata site, as recorded by a Ruatangata local. This is over late summer and autumn months, and no doubt the winter months are even worse. The fog at this site will cause major disruption to aircraft schedules.

Note that the rest of the points and concerns below can apply equally to both of the proposed Ruatangata Sites (Site 6 and Site 9).

Like any typical rural community, there is a lack of infrastructure at Ruatangata to support a major development such as an airport.

No town water supply.

No stormwater or planned drainage.

Indeed, there is not even fibre for highspeed internet at Ruatangata.

Although I do not believe there is any requirement or need for the Airport to move from Onerahi, out of the options given I believe that the One Tree Point Site is the next best alternative over and above the Ruatangata sites, due to the following reasons.

The One Tree Point Site has the best access to State Highway 1 going north and south. This site is closest to the port.

This site is closest to a residential population area that are more likely to use the air service than if it was located at a rural area.

From what I can see from the Proposal, the take off and landing zones are over water, which surely is safer than if they were over land.

But again I reiterate, I recommend that the Council adopt option 4 of the proposal and leave the airport at Onerahi, with a \$150 Million saving to ratepayers.

The most suitable geology - groundworks will be a HUGE portion of the cost of a new airport, so if the geology is good, this is a major advantage.

A lot of suitable land which could facilitate the growth of the city in that direction, if roading infrastructure to the airport is increased, there could be opportunity to create a new growth opportunity for an industrial land, which is severely constrained in Whangarei currently.

What are your key concerns about this site?

Roading access - having an upgraded road to the airport from the city should be considered, so either Pipiwai, Three Mile Bush, Church, or Kokopu Roads will need extensive roading upgrades. Ideally, there should be a 4-lane road from Otaika Roundabout through to Kokopu block road to enable efficient transport connections from the south, with improvements to pipiwai road for access from the north. My concern would be also that we make the airport too small - the runway should be large enough to allow takeoff and landing of jet-powered aircraft, or approx. 2000m of paved runway. The longer the better, as Electric aircraft could be heavier and have longer runway requirements.

If we progressed investigations on this site, what else do we need to consider?

Commercial aviation is making progress towards electrification, so ensuring there are good electrical connections to the airport to enable the High-voltage current that will be required. EV aircraft will be substantially quieter than currently as well, so this should be thought about with regards to long-term noise impacts, which are likely to lessen rather than increase. We should also consider creating, after a 4-lane road to the airport from the south, a new industrial hub of businesses in this area to create more job opportunities and income in the region.
