Email-8 Jan Boyes	Jan Boyes	I am upset that although you list most of the beaches in the Whangarei District Council area, you do not include most of the Whangarei Heads beaches. Anyone who reads the list might realise the omission. It might seem we have had few examples of problems, but this may well be because of the existing bylaws. We, like the rest of the beaches in the district, have attractive beachfronts where a gathering could easily turn noisy and nasty – and we are a long way from the city so getting police help would take too long.
		My submission asks that we should all keep the rather low key protection we have now. Please leave "the blanket coastal ban that applies from mean low water springs 300 metres landwards." This covers most coastal roadways, beachfronts and coastal reserves.
	If this could be continued for all areas that would please me. Whangarei Heads should not be such an obvious exclusion. At the moment anyone writing about a new bylaw like this could make a summary for a newspaper that makes a comment saying "There are no alcohol bans anywhere at Whangarei Heads."	
		It is probably worth reminding you that only a few weeks ago a party got out of control late at night in (and in the carpark of) the Taurikura Hall, itself 50 metres form the beach. Youngsters were parked and spread along the beachfront and up to the Hall and its carpark. At least 2 police cars attended this incident.

	(Whangarei Heads Citizens	We understand currently there is a District-wide ban that applies 300m landwards from the mean low tide mark and the proposed changes include:
	Association)	Changing the operative times of the existing alcohol bans in the following coastal locations from 24 hours per day to 7pm-7am:
		– Oakura
		– Whananaki North
		– Whananaki South
		- Matapouri/Whale Bay
		- Pataua North and South
		• Introducing new beach and foreshore bans in Bream Bay, from Marsden Point to Waipu Cove and at Langs Beach. These bans would also apply daily from 7pm to 7am.
		Lifting the blanket coastal ban that applies from mean low water springs 300 metres landwards, which now largely duplicates the other coastal bans in place.
		These proposed changes will enable the consumption of alcohol in all coastal beach and foreshore areas in the Whangarei Heads area at any time. We understand the exclusion of the Whangarei Heads area is a

result of a relative lack of reported problems related to drinking in these areas.

It is unclear if the current blanket coastal ban has resulted in the relative lack of reported problems related to drinking in these areas.

We would like to seek clarification on the following:

Alcohol bans give police extra search and arrest powers. When there are no alcohol bans in place what enforcement action will the police have related to drinking in the Whangarei Heads area.

If problems arise is council able to introduce a new ban and/or amend the bylaw at anytime or can this only be done at the next bylaw review?

The WHCA is not in a position to propose any amendments or changes at this time as we have not had the time and resources to consult with community on the proposed bylaw changes.

We will however keep our local community informed of the bylaw changes and encourage them to report any issues or concerns they may have.
