### 2.1 Local Water Done Well update

Meeting: Council Briefing

Date of meeting: 28 May 2025

### 1 Purpose / Te Kaupapa

For Council to consider the 73 submissions received on the Consultation Document for the Local Water Done Well consultation.

#### 2 Background / Horopaki

On 27 March 2025 Council adopted the Local Water Done Well Consultation Document, resolving to consult on the following options for the future of Whangarei's water services delivery:

- Option 1 (our preferred option): In-house business unit with increased collaboration with Northland councils
- Option 2: Northland Council Controlled Organisation (CCO) with Kaipara District Council and Far North District Council (drinking water and wastewater only)

#### **Consultation document**

The Consultation Document was prepared in accordance with the requirements of section 28 of the Local Government (Water Services) Bill. It explained the proposal and the reasons for it before providing context on how Whangarei's water services perform today. The two options were analysed, including information on how each could affect rates, debt, levels of service, any other charges for water services, as well as the potential implications of a CCO with Far North District Council and Kaipara District Council. It also noted which option was preferred by Council and its reasons for this.

This document was made available to the community for consultation between 2 April 2025 and 2 May 2025 and the public was encouraged to let Council know what they did and did not like about each option.

#### **Communication and engagement**

Awareness of this consultation was heavily promoted both prior to and during the consultation period via the Council's website, newsletters, rates insert and social media platforms, the local newspaper, local radio ads and interviews, online display ads, digital billboards, and Council advisory groups. A dedicated event for the district's resident and ratepayers associations, as well as three public drop-in sessions were also held early in the consultation period.

#### 3 Discussion / Whakawhiti korero

Council must now consider the submissions received and provide any feedback before a recommendation on which option Council should choose is made to Council in June. This is a critical step in preparing the Water Services Delivery Plan and to reach formal adoption before it is submitted to Central Government before 3 September 2025.

Council received 73 submissions via its online form, email, post, in person and phone. Twelve submissions commented on water issues outside of Local Water Done Well and these have been passed to the appropriate Council staff for inclusion in the waters section of the annual plan consultation report. This consultation did not require hearings or deliberations under the Bill.

Staff have analysed all submissions identifying that overall, sentiment was weighted in favour of the Council's preferred option. Of the submissions related to Local Water Done Well, approximately 73% leaned towards option 1, while 19% leaned toward option 2, and 8% did not show a clear preference. A full report of submissions can be found in the appendices.

A regional elected members working group has been formed to help guide LWDW. It is intended that these consultation results, along with those from Far North and Kaipara councils, will be shared to assist the group develop the Water Services Plans.

#### Feedback on option 1

Common themes among those who leaned towards option 1 were that Whangarei has proven it can manage its water effectively, it will cost less to set up and result in less debt, it won't require cross subsidisation of neighbouring councils, it avoids increased bureaucracy, and that local (Whangarei) control and democratic processes are important.

#### Feedback snippets of those who leaned towards option 1 (verbatim):

- WDC waters are performing well, and we do not need to pick up the known poor infrastructure, future costs and systems from these Councils.
- Increased collaboration with Northland councils not required you are elected to look after the Whangarei District only
- Gives more control to the local council and avoids potential for loss of control by extending out to multiple regions. I don't like the idea of including other councils in the plan as each geographical area is separate and should have a say on their specific water sources
- I like that there would still be the opportunity to collaborate with other Northland councils and that the CCO option isn't completely shut off.
- CCO's become big hollow pits that syphon funds into who knows where. Reserve funds currently held by WDC would be syphoned off in order to provide Kaipara & Far North councils funds meaning WDC would not have these reserves available to continue improving the infrastructure within WDC catchment. It would mean debt would be required to carry out these projects. This is not a scenario we want to enter into.
- I oppose option 2. If central government wants us to fund kaipara and far north districts water the local government minister should amalgamate northland
- In other parts of Northland, a lack of forward planning, in the past, has led to underinvestment in water infrastructure. This has led to problems that will require a lot of money to fix. I don't think it is fair that WDC ratepayers should have to shoulder that burden when they, through WDC, have invested heavily, over a long period of time, to build the water infrastructure we now have.
- Whangarei District has managed its water services very capably over many years. We are not having to do catch up. For this reason I feel that our water services should remain within Council as proposed in Option 1

#### Feedback on option 2

Common themes among those who leaned towards option 2 were that Whangarei has a social responsibility to help its neighbours, borrowing potential would increase, and that elected Councillors currently have too much control over water services.

#### Feedback snippets of those in support of option 2 (verbatim):

- An essential service like water infrastructure should not be a political decision. For the
  betterment of the community as a whole, decisions should be taken away from local
  politics, and election cycles. Decisions should purely be made on keeping people safe.
  A regional CCO enables this, and more long term certainty. We should do everything in
  our power to ensure our communities, including our wider community, have access to
  safe and secure water.
- I think that WDC should support the smaller (less populated) authorities through these
  changes. Recruiting any specialist staff in Northland is always challenging, trying to do
  this in triplicate is a poor use of resources. The CCO approach is the most pragmatic.
- Increased borrowing potential and less involvement on day to day issues from councillors.
- Professionals will be managing the system with less political interference. We have a social responsibility to support the other two districts to some degree. So has central govt.
- Two other councils do need help and we should help them by taking option two. Some of the areas have a small ratepayer base and low incomes. I think they should pay a greater share of the upcoming costs but be subsidized by WDC ratepayer to some degree. This option gives non professional councillors too much power. In the great fluoride debacle, pressure groups subverted the proven science, and our mayor and deputy went down the rabbit hole, costing ratepayers funds. To my knowledge, the councillors who voted against fluoridation have not admitted they were wrong or apologized for wasting resources. I have no faith in those six and mayor to make sound decisions, so I do not want this council or future councils following some conspiracy by ignoring the sound scientific information or being influenced by emotive people from down the rabbit hole.

Given the nature of the feedback, and pending discussion at this Council briefing, an agenda item will be prepared for the Council Meeting in June, where it will be recommended that Council adopts option 1.

While previous councils have shown foresight and wisdom when investing in our water services, the present council allowed ideology and misinformation to creep in and lead to irrational and wasteful decisions. I have lost my trust in our council that they will continue to make prudent decisions regarding our water services. Not wanting to support water services upgrades in our neighbouring district and adopting a "WDC first" stance feels callous and disrespectful to me. Limiting our borrowing headroom and kicking the can down the road with regards to efficiencies of scale and regional collaboration appears shortsighted if a CCO is on the cards within three to five years anyway. Also, councils don't provide other utilities, like electricity, gas or internet access, so why are we so obsessed with the idea that only councils can provide water services properly?

I'd rather get on with setting up a CCO right now, and I'm willing to contribute to that with my water rates.

## Submission on WDC annual plan and Water Done Well

#### **Executive summary**

NorthChamber is the champion and advocate for business across Tai Tokerau/Northland. WDC has published its proposals for the annual plan with rates options for 2025-26, along with Local Water Done Well. Given the tight timeframe for feedback on both consultations, NorthChamber is submitting on a broad premise, which is focussed on minimising costs to doing business, but also acknowledge that we are still working with our members to gain empirical feedback data.

At a strategic level, NorthChamber would challenge council to consider their cost structures, and project priorities, in the same manner that central government is doing currently. Given the increases being proposed to businesses, it would be helpful if the Council provided some detail in the consultation document about the cost saving measures that you have implemented, prior to concluding that further cost increases are necessary. At a micro level, NorthChamber seeks options that limit cost increases for businesses.

#### WDC Annual Plan 2025-26 consultation

Consultation topic 1. New stormwater targeted rate

Option 1 (WDC preferred option)

Introduce a District-wide universal rate of \$0.0003696 per dollar of land value. This would work out to be an average annual cost of \$180 per household.

#### Option 2

Introduce a District-wide universal rate of \$172 per separately used or inhabited parts (SUIP) of a rating unit. A SUIP refers to any part of a property that is used for a different purpose or inhabited by someone (i.e. if you had two homes on one property, you would be charged twice).

#### NorthChamber provisional position; Select Option 2

- Further rating on land value does not spread the load equally among ratepayers.
- The Consultation Document is silent on the effect on business or others. The document is misleading in that it states Option 1 in terms of a cost per household of \$180 **per household.** However, the rate is also applied to other categories including business, where the cost is likely to be much higher than \$180.
- Option 2 is a flat charge which spreads the cost equally among ratepayers.

Consultation topic 2, Reducing the Uniform Annual General Charge (UAGC)

Option 1 (WDC preferred option)

We reduce the UAGC from \$909 to \$500 for 2025-26 to relieve some of the rate burden for lower-value property owners.



#### Option 2

Leave the UAGC at \$909 in line with what was set in the 2024-34 Long-Term Plan. This would see the share of rates paid by lower- and higher-value properties remain the same as what we have today.

#### NorthChamber provisional position; Select Option 2

- The reduction in revenue is added on to all ratepayers who are not 'lower value property owners'.
  - o This is likely to include all commercial property owners and tenants.
  - This could include superannuants who have held property for many years and whose property has increased over time, but who have no way to improve their income
- The document provides no rationale for favouring one group of ratepayers over another and does not recognise that the current economic climate is affecting all ratepayers, particularly business.
- This is another way for business to bear a higher load of civic costs than its land-value based share for no apparent benefit.
- The document ignores the concept of user-pays.

Consultation topic 3, Relief for farmed business-zoned land

#### Option 1 (WDC preferred option)

Increase Commercial & Industrial and Rural rates by 1.2% to provide temporary relief to owners of business-zoned property used for farming. Support will be available for a maximum of three years, after which landowners will transition to full business-zone rates.

#### Option 2

Do not provide temporary relief to owners of business-zoned property used for farming. This would mean properties would continue to be rated within their current zoning with no relief provided. Under this option, the additional 1.2% rate increase for Commercial & Industrial and Rural rates will not be needed to fund the proposed business-zone rates adjustment.

#### NorthChamber provisional position; Select Option 2

- Commercial and industrial ratepayers with high-value undeveloped land who are **unable to use it for farming** are in a worse position than those who can use it for farming. Farming assumedly generates income. There are commercial and industrial high-value undeveloped properties that are currently undeveloped for a raft of reasons such as:
  - o Land requires significant investment that is unjustified in economic environment
  - o Lack of demand for industrial tenancies
  - Development process takes several years
- If the council is inclined to subsidise ratepayers who own high-value undeveloped land that has no income attached to it, then this subsidy should be applied evenly and fairly to all ratepayers in the category, not just those that are farming.
- A contestable fund sounds subjective. The Consultation Document has not provided any framework around how this fund will be allocated and who the decision makers will be.

# NZ CHAMBERS OF COMMERCE NorthChamber

While it is acknowledged that council has responsibility to zone sufficient land for future economic development, this requirement disadvantages many landowners through no fault of their own. All C&I zoned land should be rated 1:1 differential with other types of land to eliminate the underlying inequities created through the differential rating system.

### **Rationale for NorthChamber position**

The option 1 proposals add significant additional costs to small businesses in particular. A landlord receiving a circa 30% increase in rates will pass this straight through to the tenant. Small businesses already financially stressed will find this a significant burden, to the point of considering whether to retain staff and keep the doors open.

The cumulative effect of all three matters for consultation is to further burden the commercial and industrial sector of ratepayers who are already disadvantaged through the differential rating policy and paying more than their share of rates based on land value.


The land value of commercial and industrial (C&I) is 9.3% of the district's land yet the C&I sector pays 24% of the rates. The council has not justified the difference between the two or demonstrated why it believes that the C&I sector should pay 24% of the rates burden.

The increase in rates for industrial properties over the last few years has been extreme. <u>For example, an engineering workshop in the Port Road area went from total rates of \$21,975 incl GST in 2019/2020 to \$36,089 in 2025/6. That is an increase of 64%, if the Council's preferred options are chosen.</u>

The council's differential policy combined with their political stance that some sectors should not pay their share (primarily residential) significantly disadvantages business in the Whangarei District. The "preferred options" (Option 1 in each case) in this Annual Plan Consultation Document further disadvantage businesses (who don't have a vote) in favour of the voting public.

QUESTION: Can the Councillors explain why the Commercial & Industrial sector are to pay 24% of rates when they have 9.3% of the land value ie 15% more than their share?

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#### 1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 Northland Federated Farmers (Federated Farmers) appreciates this opportunity to submit on the Far North District Council's (Council) proposal as to how it should deliver water services (Local Water done Well). Federated Farmers has over 183 active members located in the Whangarei district area.
- 1.2 Federated Farmers acknowledge any submissions from individual members of our organisation.
- 1.3 Federated Farmers would like the opportunity to speak to Council about this submission.
- 1.4 Federated Farmers is focused on the transparency of decision making under the Resource Management Act 1991 and the Local Government Act 2002 to ensure farming and the rural sector are treated in an equitable manner. It submits on documents produced under these Acts across New Zealand and make helpful proposals when the opportunity is provided.
- 1.5 Federated Farmers also submit on central government policies that affect local government revenue and spending, with the aim of ensuring that local government have the appropriate tools to conduct their functions.

#### 2. GENERAL COMMENTS

- 2.1 Federated Farmers is generally supportive of the Local Water done well programme as it will ensure many positive benefits for water users including:
  - (a) Water services remaining publicly owned.
  - (b) Stricter application of rules for environmental, safety and financial matters.
  - (c) The active involvement of communities and tangata whenua in decision-making.

- 2.2 The Council is required to decide on whether it will manage its water separately or combined with other Councils in a council owned organisation to provide water services. Whangarei District Council has indicated that its preferred option for providing its water services is an in-house unit with increased collaboration with the other Northland councils. The Council believes that it has shown that it has the capacity to build, operate and maintain great water services for the district. It sees that the retention of water service in-house would see its service delivery remaining strong.1
